against the attempt to do this dis-

council met on Monday at Union-
ville, and took the oath of office be-

was in the chair, and others pre-
sent were Deputy Reeve Robt. Smith,
Councilors Fred Coakwell, W. H.
Clark and George Hoover.

A large crowd was present, when
the question of relief was upper-
