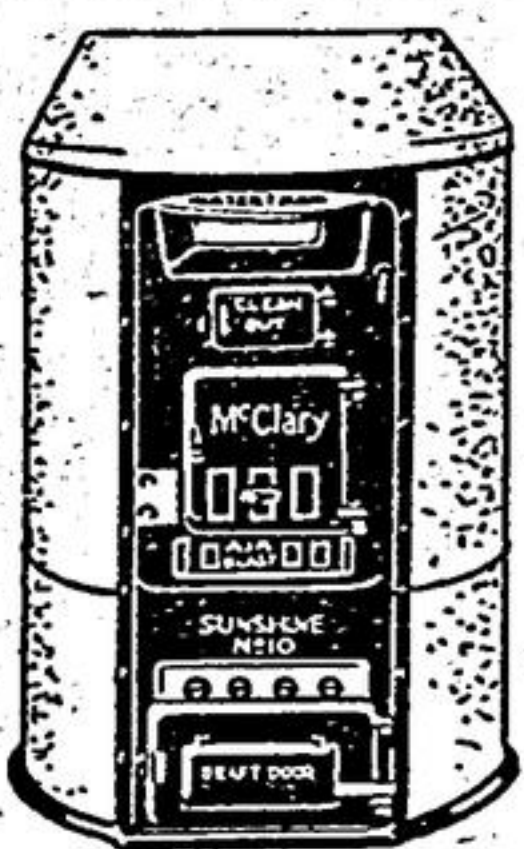


BALLANTRAE

Would Ban Sunday Funerals

Local Ministerial Ass'n Fall to Convince Council That Sabbath Burials Should Be Tabooed Except in Emergency.

A popular institution, "Sunday Funerals," was under attack at the Town Council meeting, up in Walker, says The Bruce Herald and Times, on Monday night, and this from no less an august body than the Walkerton Ministerial Association, who in a communication to the Board sought to have the Council prohibit interments in the Walkerton cemetery on the Sabbath except in cases of emergency.

Like in most issues of this kind there are two sides to the question. As one councillor pointed out the Sabbath is about the only day in the week that many business men, working people and others can get off to attend such events, while again it was shown that funerals are frequently arranged for Sunday out of consideration for the friends and relatives who have to motor a distance and get back to their duties again. To put the ban on interments in the Walkerton cemetery on the Sabbath, the Council, as a whole, seem to feel, would be taking a most unpopular and an altogether too arbitrary a stand.

Nor did the Council, in coming to this decision lose sight of the fact that Sunday was the ministers' busiest day and that it was but natural that the "men of the cloth" should be opposed to funeral rites being crowded into their other duties on the Sabbath.

While they have it in their own hands, whether they will so officiate on the Lord's Day or not, yet as one canny Alderman suggested, it looks like they weren't adverse to passing the buck and having the Council do the refusing for them via the non-Sabbath interment ordinance suggested.

Realizing probably that a man has to be rather outstanding in the community to attract much of a gathering at his last sad rites if they are held on any day but the Sabbath, and even then it is sometimes hard to get such a showing as will make the neighbors envious, and so, it is not perhaps presuming too much to say, that some Councillors may have had their eyes focused on that distant time when they shall be called upon to step out of the veil themselves and knowing the crowd-drawing tendencies of a Sabbath burial may want to stop traffic and cause a feeling of awe at the size of the gathering when they embark.

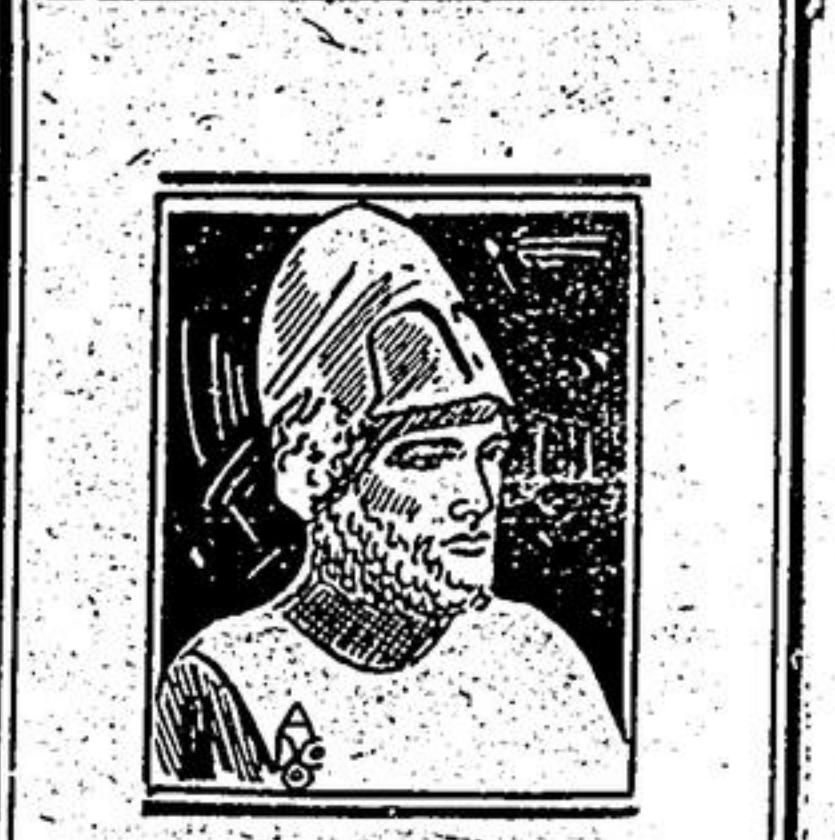

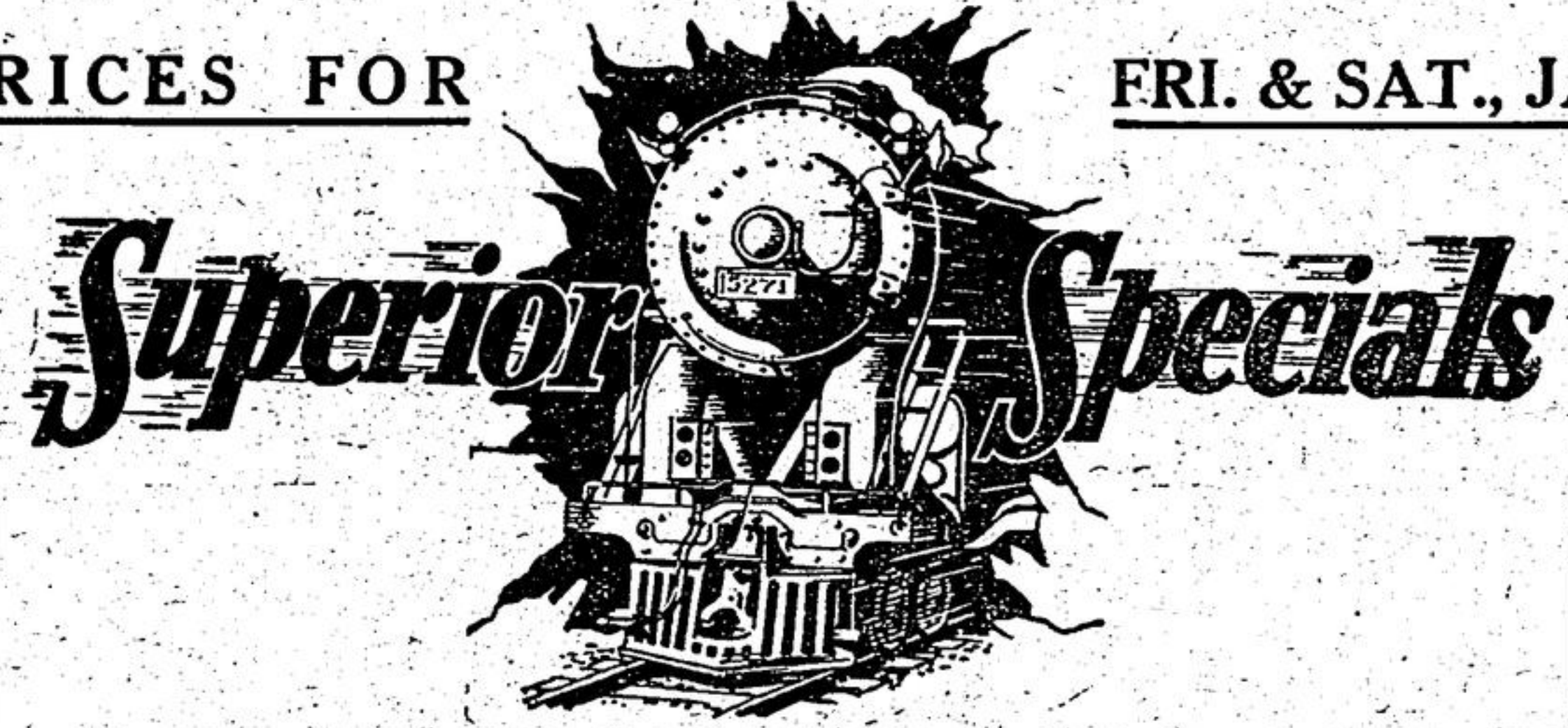
