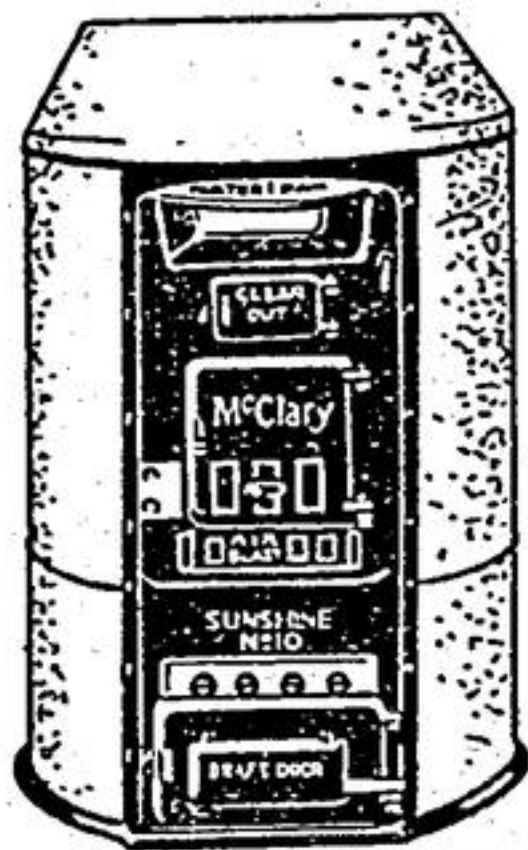

**FAVOR CUTTING
TEACHERS' PAY**

Delegates of the Associated High School Boards of York County, at the annual meeting in Earl Haig Collegiate, Willowdale, Saturday went on record as being in favor of reduction of teachers' salaries as a means of lowering maintenance costs of high schools in the county. A resolution to this effect, moved by Dr. F. M. Cruikshank of Weston and seconded by J. D. Hilliers of east York, was carried following a lengthy discussion on the question, in which difference of opinion amongst the 42 delegates representing eleven schools, was heard. Spokesmen for ten of the eleven schools voted in favor of Dr. Cruikshank's resolution and it was carried seven to three.

The resolution read: Whereas this association realizes the high school board of the County of York must substantially reduce the burden of costs and whereas over 85 per cent of the maintenance cost of this is due to teachers' salaries, the feeling of this meeting is that an effort should be made at once to reach a more equitable schedule. A. F. Wilson of Markham was of the opinion that high salaries were not absolutely necessary to get good results. Alex. Baird of Scarboro and Geo. Webster of East York voiced objection to the proposed cut.

A second resolution asking that the executive committee examine and consider the cost of maintenance of the different schools and send to the individual boards an analysis of the same with such recommendations as it deem advisable with a view of modifying costs, was also approved.
