

## By the Sea On Holiday

The place of our sojourn this year by the sea was an ideal little spot—

"All sand and cliff and deep murmuring cave."

And these words of Tennyson's give a very true description of the shores around the peaceful village on the coast, with its little white cots above the golden stretch of sand, sunning themselves in the pure sunlight, sparkling in the clear air. It was an ideal spot for a peaceful sojourn; it is a fair picture to conjure up in the Autumn twilight. How often will steal back to my memory that little village by the sea, ever as vivid and as fair in color and detail as a picture fresh from an artist's easel; its quaint street, each little fisher-homestead with its well-stocked garden of old-world flowers.

In the distance, back from the cliffs, stretched acres of wind-kissed forage, comprised of red sainfoin and giant crimson clover; and farther still stretched the ripening wheat, over which the cloud-shadows played at times, sketching on the miles of verdure, most fanciful pictures.

But the village itself had the greatest charm; ordered and exact in its life day after day, with its homecoming of the fishers at dawn, and the greetings in the little harbor down below; night after night the sailing out of the boats, merry voices down the dim streets at the hour when the stars were born above the foam. Besides a score of fisher-homesteads a shop or two comprised the village. From open doors might be seen hanging from rafters the langle of nets, or wives at the thresholds mending the rends in them—the work of stormy nights. A source of great delight were the gardens, not so much for the sake of the flowers but because of the quaint names bestowed upon the blossoms. Honesty was a favorite flower, named by the fishers as "Silks-and-satins"; loved chiefly by most of us for its curious seed vessels, which glimmer like threaded moonstones. (This likeness of mine was verified when I discovered that the meaning of its name Lunaria, referred to the shape and color of the seed-vessels.) Alyseum Maritimum was known only by the name of "Snow-in-Summer," and the golden toad-flax around the garden gates as "Roving sailor."—In "From a Middlesex Garden," by Alfred H. Hyatt.

### Crocus Dates Far Back In Horticultural Annals

The crocus has its home on the shores of the Mediterranean Sea and eastward into Asia. The name crocus is of Greek origin and means saffran. Saffran in turn is the English spelling of the Arabic word "zafran."

The orange-yellow stigmas were dried and used in medicine, of early times. They also were used in coloring, and still today the Persians and Spaniards mix them with their rice. In Greece and Rome, saffran was used as a perfume. It also was employed extensively as a yellow dye and still is today in certain sections of the old world. Commercial plantings of crocus for the manufacture of saffran are still to be found in Persia, Spain, France and Sicily.

To us crocus is one of the loveliest of all spring-flowering plants, although there also are fall-flowering crocuses in existence. Soon after the snow-drops have put in their appearance come the crocuses with their large showy blooms in white, yellow, purple, and stripes of lilac and purple on a white ground. Crocus must be grown in a sunny place. Otherwise the blooms do not open up fully.

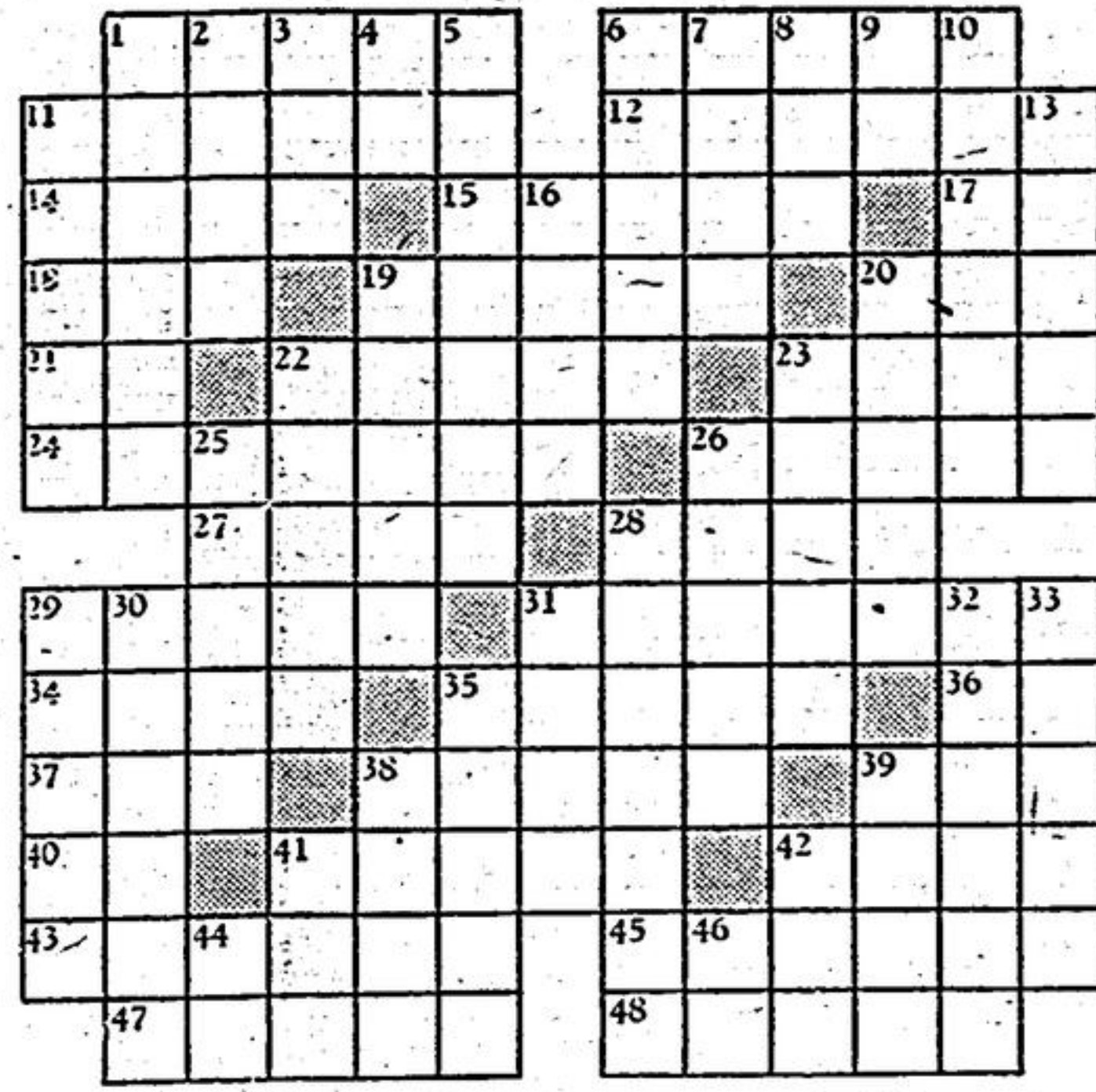

## Canadian Pine Valuable Wood

There are nine distinct pine species native to Canada, of which six are of great commercial importance. Eastern white pine is the most valuable coniferous wood in Canada. Up to a few years ago it was the most important in point of quantity exported, but recently there has been a relative scarcity. The Western white pine is similar in most respects to the Eastern species but does not form extensive prairie stands. It is confined to the Province of British Columbia. The red or Norway pine of Eastern Canada is harder and more resinous than the white pine, and the tree is a valuable source of structural timber as well as of sawn lumber. The Western yellow or "bull" pine or the interior of British Columbia is softer and lighter in color than the red pine, and is now extensively used as a substitute for white pine.

There are three hemlock species in Canada's forests, two of which are valuable timber trees. The Eastern hemlock is abundant throughout its range in the Eastern Provinces, but is not found west of the Province of Ontario. The wood is chiefly used for construction, especially in house-framing. It supplies the demand for a cheap, strong material for many purposes, including poles, mining timber, pulpwood and firewood, and its bark is a valuable source of tannin. The Western hemlock is found in Canada only in the Province of British Columbia, and is becoming more valuable each year as its qualities are better appreciated. The Western species is used more extensively than the Eastern in pulp manufacture.

There are only two species of the genus commonly called cedar in Canada. They are both of great commercial importance, each in its own region as their ranges do not overlap. The wood of the cedars is the most durable coniferous wood grown in the Dominion. The Eastern tree, white cedar, is found from the Atlantic to the south-east part of Manitoba. Cedar is preferred to all other native woods for shingles and for all structural work exposed to moisture, enormous quantities being used for poles and fence posts. The Western red cedar is one of the giants of the Pacific coast, being surpassed in size only by the Douglas fir. Its wood is made into shingles to a greater extent than any other wood in Canada, and it is also sawn into lumber.
