

# Ford Provides Aid

Detroit.-Henry Ford and -Edsel Ford Sunday night joined in backing reorganization of the First National and Union Guardian Bank of Commerce here, providing the \$8,250,000 capital required.

At the same time, William J. Cameron, Ford's' executive secretary, announced that incorporation of the new institutions had already taken place, that they would open soon and that dopositors in the banks now would probably receive 30 per cent. immediately.

The two new banks will take over, the story said, all of the liquid assets of the First National Bank and the Guardian National Bank of Commerce, both important Detroit institutions.

### Issue Statement

The Fords issued a joint statement in which they offered to furnish the capital providing the depositors and directors of the two institutions had confidence in their ability to choose men to direct the affairs of the two banks and were willing to unite them later to form one bank.
