DEBTS TOO HEAVY

Herman Kidd of Whitchurch Calls For Freer Trade and Russian Market

(Toronto Star)

Revolution in Canada within a
year unless Premier Bennett accedes
to the wishes of the Canadian farmer
in the matter of changed financial
conditions was predicted by Reeve
Herman Kidd of Whitchurch, presi-
dent of the Whitchurch Township
Liberal Association, in an interview
with The Star.

Whitchurch township has never
issued a debenture. Financing, ac-
cording to Reeve Kidd, has been
on the pay-as-you go policy and the
municipality has never gone behind
in its accounts. This is Reeve Kidd's
12th year on council and his fifth
term as Reeve.

For the first time in its history
there are taxes owing on the 1932
budget of \$62,000. Thirty per cent.
or \$18,600 of last year's taxes is out
standing.

"It isn't that the farmers don't
want to pay—they simply haven't
got the money," commented Reeve
Kidd.

Lower Tariffs Must Come
"Lower tariffs and world-wide
trade agreements have got to come
if prosperity is ever to return."

"Premier Bennett is like a chain-
ed-up dog that is being tormented,"
declared Reeve Kidd. "The chain is
holding Bennett and he can't seem
to get away from it. He ought to
get out and let someone else in. He
has tried to run the country and
failed miserably. If he keeps on a
year longer the farmers and other
citizens will be out in open revolt.
The situation is critical."

Reeve Kidd feels that the present
difficulty in York county, with
approximately 70 per cent of the
1932 levy unpaid, is a direct result
of a money-spending policy which he
has consistently opposed for several
years.

"The Dominion is so heavily in
debt that it can't clear itself in a
hundred years. Most of the debt is
internal, but if things go on as they

are the country will be in the hands
of the money-lenders before very
long. The government will have to
default on some of its bonds to the
large companies or else there will
have to be inflation. Ottawa has
been sitting still waiting for some-
thing to happen. Something will
happen, but it won't be what Ottawa
expects."
