"Sales of red onions in particular, were slow in December and January, and only recently have shown signs of normal movement. So far as this variety is concerned on the Montreal market, local supplies are sufficient to last about ten days only. After the quantity on hand is exhausted, Ontario will be called on for supplies."

In regard to supplies on hand, in Ontario producing districts, Mr. Carroll said that the amount, as of February 15, was some 175 carloads. Shrinkage, however, would probably reduce this supply by some 10 to 15 per cent.

THE FARM COLUMN

Public Stock Yards in 1932
During the twelve months of 1932, fewer cattle were marketed at public stock yards by approximately 76,000 head, as compared with the previous year. The curtailment in the movement to market, should not, however, be considered as an indication of a relative decline in production. Prices were a ruling influence and were consistently responsible for a commendable caution in respect to loadings. It was pointed out most frequently during the year that the condition of the market was such that even a normal run would develop almost unsaleable carry-overs.

Cattle For British Market Must Be Carefully Selected.

"Is our export of beef and stocker cattle being jeopardized by the methods of a certain number of producers?" This was the question of Garnet H. Duncan, livestock investigator, Ontario Marketing Board. Mr. Duncan pointed to the fact that a high percentage of Canadian heifers, arriving in Great Britain have proved to be with calf. It is his thought that, since there is no market for that class of livestock in the Old Country at present, the continuing of this practice will work to the disadvantage of all producers. Great Britain has the potentialities of becoming our greatest market, and therefore, is worthy of our best products. Carelessness in the class of stock shipped to that country, must result in the destruction of a most valuable outlet.

Seed Grain Scarce
Reports to the Department indicate that seed grain is becoming scarce. The small remaining supply in farmers' hands is confined to Eastern Ontario and the New Liskeard district. The farmer who

NORTH YORK TAKES ON ADDITIONAL TERRITORY

Redistribution of ridings for provincial election purposes, finds the village of Stouffville still in East York. East York remains unchanged with the loss of Richmond Hill.

North York riding where Clifford Case, M.P.P. will be opposed by Mr. Morgan Baker of Whitechurch, will comprise the townships of King, Whitechurch, Georgina, East Vaughan and that part of the township of North York lying west of the centre line of North Yonge street, the towns of Aurora and Newmarket and the villages of Holland Landing, Sutton, Richmond Hill, and Woodbridge.

The additional territory added to North York on the south of the riding, is no doubt done with the hope that it will benefit the chances of Mr. Case. This, of course, is by no means certain to-day.

The riding of South Ontario which includes Oshawa city is unchanged, but the old riding of North Ontario is wiped out of existence, and is taken into Muskoka. Thus two ridings, East York and Muskoka, stretch as it were almost from pole to pole or from Lake Ontario to north of Gravenhurst.

North Ontario was represented in the legislature by Mr. James Blanchard, who it is said is likely to be appointed to a post in the county town of Whitby.

FARMER CHEATED BY COMPANY

The milk inquiry, at Ottawa continues to furnish the most sensational news at Ottawa. A former book-keeper of a Montreal dairy company swore that by use of "fictitious surplus, that is, giving only surplus price to farmers and then selling the milk to consumers at the regular rate, the company in the first nine months of 1931 had paid producers from 3c to 19c less per hundred pounds than the farmers were entitled to, and that in the one month of September, 1931, alone, this was equal to cheating the farmers out of \$1,370.

W. H. Taylor (Lib. Norfolk-Elgin) told the committee he had been informed that the Borden Company of New York had telephoned its Canadian office to "clear all files" of evidence which might be damaging if brought out at the inquiry. Officials of the company were unable to throw any light on this alleged conversation.

The Borden subsidiary at Ottawa, a \$1,700,000 company, has built up reserves of over two million dollars, of which \$745,761 represents profits made in the past five years. The New York company owns all the stock and can at any time remove this profit surplus to the United States, witnesses stated. Asked if he knew of any farmer in the Ottawa area who had built up any kind of a reserve by producing milk for them, the general manager of the Ottawa dairy, admitted that he could not name any.
