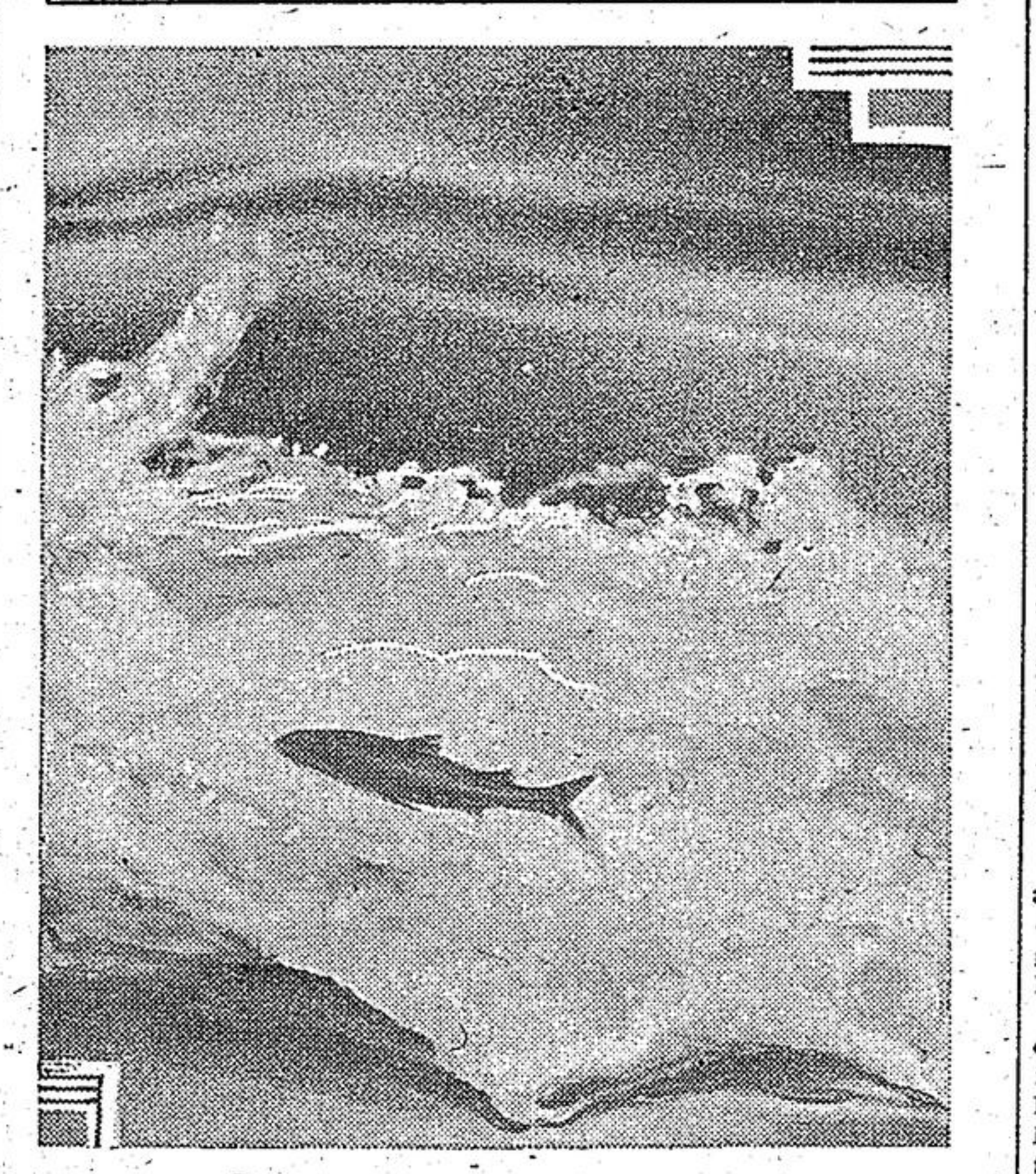

## 1864 Saw First Butter Factory In Dominion

One of Canada's First Industries—Now in Front Rank

Dairying is not only one of the oldest industries in Canada, but it is also one of the most progressive. The early French colonists brought with them a knowledge of the making of butter and cheese, and each farm was able to produce sufficient for its own requirements. In the years 1783-85 the art of butter and cheese-making was extended to Upper Canada, and dairying commenced to occupy a more stable place in the life of the country. Early records show that in 1801 there was a surplus of butter in Kingston, Ontario, and that some was exported to the United States.

It was not until 1864, however, when the first factory was established, that dairying entered upon the era of development and expansion which has placed it in the forefront of the industries of the Dominion. It owes its modern position to the introduction of

the factory system for the making of cheese and butter, the invention of the centrifugal cream separator and the facilities afforded by improved methods of cold storage. The first Canadian cheese factory was established in Ontario in 1864, and the first Canadian creamery for butter making in Quebec in 1873. The first centrifugal cream separator was imported from Denmark in 1882, and the Government organization of cold storage services dates from 1895.

In 1900 production of creamery butter was 36,066,000 pounds and the output of factory cheese 220,333,000 pounds. In 1931 production of creamery butter had risen to 225,955,000 pounds while that of factory cheese had dropped to 113,956,000 pounds.

The total value of products of the dairy factories of Canada in 1931 was \$104,482,400. This figure does not include butter made on the farm and known as "dairy butter," nor home-made cheese or the value of milk consumed fresh. The total value of all dairy products in Canada in 1931, including the items just mentioned, is estimated by the dairying authorities at \$161,243,550. To this total creamery butter contributed \$50,193,378, dairy butter (estimated) \$21,723,000, factory cheese \$12,824,695, home-made cheese (estimated) \$108,500, miscellaneous factory products \$17,082,507, and milk consumed fresh or otherwise used \$59,306,000. Production of dairy butter is estimated at 104,640,000 pounds.

British Broadcasting Co.  
To Pay Profits to Exchequer

London, Eng.—Sir Kingsley Wood, the Postmaster-General, announced in Parliament recently that the B.B.C. have agreed to make a contribution of £250,000 to the Exchequer in respect of the coming financial year. During the past year the B.B.C. have handed over £200,000 to the Exchequer.

## Shorts

Free wireless licences are now issued to 34,854 blind persons in Great Britain.

One-tenth of the policemen of the United Kingdom—or about 5,000—are occupied with traffic-control work.

Women are not really entitled to use crests or mottoes, which are technical battle symbols and war cries.

It costs over \$5,000,000 a year to give London's streets their nightly clean-up, and 8,500 men are employed on the work.

Bibles are circulated in Ceylon in twenty-six different languages, English coming third on the list in point of numbers.

Mailbags to the number of over 40,000,000 were handled by Gt. Britain's post office last year. Of this total only forty were lost or stolen.

London will receive something like 7,000 tons of spring flowers this growing season, special trains being run at the busiest time.

Every important road-crossing in London will, it is expected, be regulated by automatic light signals by the end of the year.

Upholstered seats, in a watertight cabin are provided for the drivers of a new type of motor-lorry recently put on the market in Gt. Britain.

By installing special appliances it is now possible for as many as six persons, all in different towns, to talk together by telephone.

Newly married couples in Horschel, a German town, have to plant two fruit trees for the municipality to celebrate their wedding.

Statistics prove that home accidents exceed in number those due to industry, while it is more dangerous to take a bath than take a train.

Horses are increasing in number in France; in 1891 there were 1,138,000, while the latest "horse census" shows 1,287,000, an increase of 149,000.

Nearly 10,000 pictures have been submitted for exhibition in this year's exhibition of the Royal Academy, at Burlington House, London. Of this number only 1,000 can be accepted.

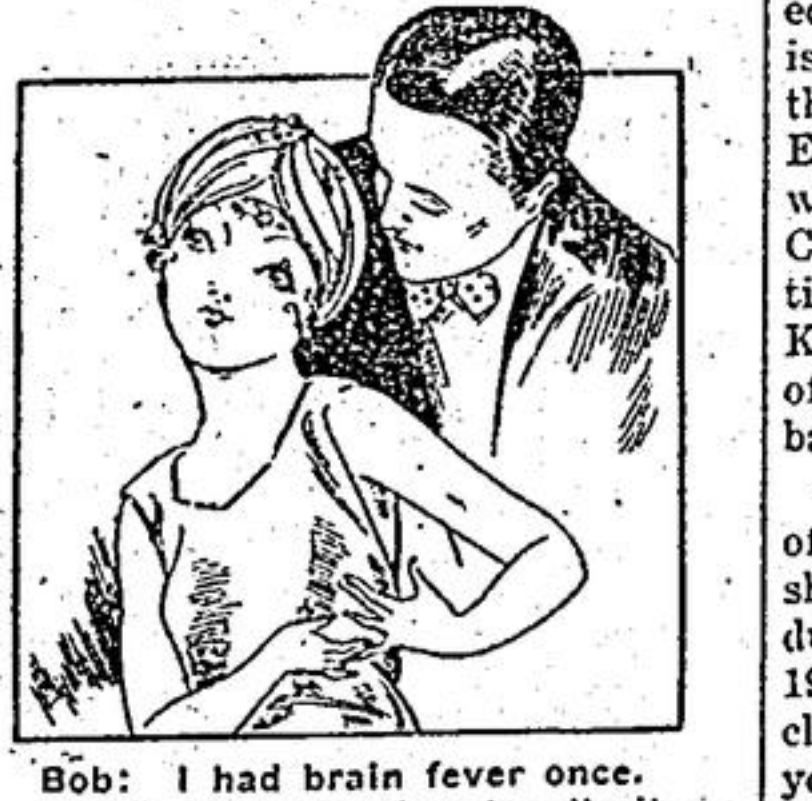

The book came into the family of Charles Weissert, present owner, in 1847, when it was presented to his mother, then a girl of seven years.

## The Dominion Coast-To-Coast

Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island.—It was reported at the recent annual meeting of the Canadian Silver Fox Breeders' Association in Charlottetown that last year 7,086 adult silver foxes and 7,994 cubs were inspected in Prince Edward Island. Ontario came next in order with 3,731 mature foxes and 4,121 cubs; Quebec followed with 3,060 and 3,694 respectively; New Brunswick with 2,795 and 3,233, and Nova Scotia with 849 and 1,041.

Saint John, New Brunswick.—Canada Veneers, Limited, will shortly build a plant at Fairville, a suburb of Saint John, for the manufacture of rotary-cut hardwood veneers and plywood. The firm foresees a market in Canada, as well as in Great Britain and the West Indies.

Quebec, Quebec.—A survey issued by the Quebec Department of Agriculture shows the gardening area of the province (exclusive of home gardens) to have been 38,600 acres in 1932, yielding crops valued at \$5,330,000. These crops, in the order of their importance, were: tomatoes, \$931,300; strawberries, \$539,000; sweet corn, \$503,100; celery, \$390,700; lettuce, \$327,100; cabbage, \$314,900; raspberries, \$287,700; onions, \$269,000; green peas, \$205,900; beets, \$200,900; green beans, \$185,100; cucumbers, \$115,700; cauliflowers, \$83,200; other small fruits making up the balance.

Ottawa.—In a report on Canada's tobacco industry, Dr. N. T. Nelson of the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, points out that with the increasing exports of raw tobacco in recent years there has come a change in the type of tobacco used. In 1927 and 1928 the bulk of the tobacco exported was Burley, but in 1931 and 1932 this had been largely supplanted by bright flue-cured. This change is mainly attributed to the work of the Tobacco Division of the Dominion Experimental Farms, in conjunction with the Department of Trade and Commerce, in bringing to the attention of manufacturers in the United Kingdom the merit and high quality of Canadian bright flue-cured tobacco.

Winnipeg, Manitoba.—Final figures of Manitoba's wool production in 1932 show that 947,000 pounds were produced, the value being \$13,800. The 1932 clip was reported to be much cleaner than in the two previous years, and the demand for it by manufacturers within the province was more active than previously.

Regina, Saskatchewan.—February's output of creamery butter in Saskatchewan amounted to 884,252 pounds, an increase of 26,351 pounds or 3 per cent. over the January production. The increase was in the central and northern parts of the province, there being a slight decrease in the southern section.

Saskatoon, Saskatchewan.—The poultry and dairy business in Saskatchewan appears to be improving, and preparations are being made for a busy season. A local box manufacturing firm has received an order for 75,000 egg boxes, and is already busy on an order for 50,000 butter boxes.

Edmonton, Alberta.—Nearly 800 pupils are registered this winter in the correspondence course in school work conducted by the Alberta Department of Education for the benefit of children in outlying districts. At present these courses apply only to public school work, but the possibility of extending them to include high school work is being considered. Vancouver, British Columbia.—The value of new building construction undertaken in Vancouver during February, helped by a recent \$100,000 permit covering the extension to Lapointe Pier on Burrard Inlet, shows an increase of 42 per cent. over the preceding month, and an increase of 11.3 per cent. over February last year.

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## Canada's Reindeer Herd Nears End of Long Trek

Ottawa.—The long trek of Canada's reindeer herd from western Alaska to the Mackenzie River delta is now nearly ended. T. G. Murphy, Minister of the Interior, stated that the herd, which has been travelling since December, 1929, has arrived at the west bank of the Mackenzie River at the delta where it flows into the Arctic Ocean.

The delta is about seventy-five miles wide, and twenty miles of this route does not furnish sufficient fodder to sustain the herd. It would be necessary to drive across this twenty miles at greater speed. Since the fawning season has now arrived this is impossible, according to word received here. As there is good pasture on the west side the Lomen Corporation, which is responsible for the delivery of the herd, has decided to pasture the animals where they now are until next autumn. At that time, when the fawns are well able to travel, the herd will be driven across the delta and delivered to the officers of the Department of the Interior, who have everything in readiness on the east side at Kittigazuit to receive the animals.
