## "Sunday a Holiday or a Holy Day"

Paper Given by Mrs. Edward P. Hoover at a Recent Meeting of Altona Women's Institute.

Sunday is the name given the first day of the week, and is observed as the Sabbath among Christian people, the world over.

Then we look up the definition of holiday, we find it is defined as a day of joy and gaiety, a festival day. We need not go very far from home to find that Sunday is being kept as a holiday in every sense of the word. There may be some who do realize from whom the great blessing comes of the Sabbath or Sunday as it is ordinarily called (but we doubt it.) To what Christian country would we go to find the people who never heard how we came to have the Sabbath.

The question naturally arises, how does it come that Sunday has been turned into a holiday, rather than the Lord's Day or Sabbath and as such is looked forward to as an opportunity for a week-end visit to the city or country, a picnic, or sight seeing trip, or worse still some professional sport that is being pulled off with never a thought that it is God's day, and as such should be kept as a holy day.

There may be several causes for the increasing desecration of the Sabbath, but we fear that one of the greatest contributing factors is traceable to the automobile. As we look backward to the time when the automobile first came into existence, can we not see the increasing desecration of the Sabbath keeping pace with the ever increasing popularity of the automobile?

The automobile is here and here to stay, no doubt. A wonderful invention it is, and it may be the means of great blessing, or it may be a curse if it is allowed to cause us to desecrate the Sabbath or break any of God's whatsoever.

Christ said that the Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath. Just as it may be said of the automobile, if we allow it to control us instead of us controlling it, it may run away with our heads, hearts, and pocket-books.

In the first place God created the Sabbath in that He ended his work which He had made, and rested from all his work as we read in Gen. 2:2. No doubt we may take it that if God needed rest on the seventh day, that we will need it also. God also said, remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy. Six days shalt thou labour and do all thy work, but the seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord thy God, in it thou shalt not do any work, is a familiar commandment to us all. Death was the penalty for disobedience to this command (Ex. 35:2) There is a startling incident recorded in the Bible, of a man who had disobeyed this commandment God commanded Moses to have that man stoned to death, just for picking up sticks on the Sabbath day.

God had been having a hard time trying to impress his people with the importance of absolute obedience and thus made a terrible example of this man. If God were to so discipline us to-day, how many of us would escape the stoning, and for more grievous offences than picking up sticks. No doubt that poor man was exceptionally busy on Saturday, or perhaps just forgot to gather in the extra supply needed for the Sabbath the day before. Now we have some otherwise good people who remain at home on the Sabbath to prepare a good roast dinner for the "bunch" with little or no confusion.

Let us consider for a moment what God does require of us on the Sabbath—First of all, as before mentioned "Remember the Sabbath Day to Keep it Holy." Among other definitions, holy means divine, pure religion, hallowed, sanctified, sacred. The Lord blessed the Sabbath Day and hallowed it, and it becomes us as his creatures to do likewise. The Sabbath day should intelligent people talk about being "hored" because they are expected to respect the Sabbath, but will regard it as the hymn-writer expresses it "Day of all the week the best emblem of eternal rest."

There are plenty of pleasant and useful things to do on the Sabbath, as well as profitable. Not to be valued in dollars and cents, but in spiritual and intellectual pleasures and development. Christ said it was lawful to do good on the Sabbath day. Christ was always found in the temple on a Sabbath, and we should always be found in the house of God whenever possible. Also visiting the sick and shut-ins will be pleasing to God. There are special blessings and promises to those who keep the Sabbath, found in Isaiah 56:4:7 For thus saith the Lord unto the eunuchs that keep my Sabbaths and choose the name of the Lord to serve him, and take hold of my covenant. Even unto them will I give in mine house and within my walls a place and a name better than of sons and daughters: I will give them an everlasting name that shall not be cut off also the sons of the stranger that join themselves to the Lord to serve him and to love the name of the Lord to keep his Sabbath from polluting it, and take hold of my covenant; Even them will I bring to my holy mountain and make them joyful in my house of prayer; their burnt offerings and their sacrifices shall be accepted upon mine altar; for mine house shall be called a house of prayer for all people.

Much is being said both from pulpit and press about the world in general having gotten away from God. No doubt one of the healthy signs of getting back to God will be the restoration of the old fashioned way of observing the Sabbath. Let our cars take us to church, and not away from it.

## THE SYSTEM IS FAULTY

(Walkerton Times)  
Members of the Toronto West Presbytery of the United Church discussed salaries and living conditions of ministers, especially those in the poorer districts. One minister said his wife had to go into the city and do nursing so she could earn \$10 per week to try and pay the household expenses. The minister admitted he was in debt; he had but 15 cents in his pocket and was unable to stay and partake of the fifty-cent lunch which was to follow the Presbytery meeting.  
It is recorded, also, that at this meeting the suggestion was made that class distinctions existed among the ministers, and also that there was keen and undignified competition for calls to pulpits in the more lucrative field.  
It is not entirely possible to turn back to Bible precedent in this matter. The organization of churches, the manner of their government, the financing of them and the stationing of their ministers is not dealt with. The present system which we use is one which we have created in order to fit the needs of our times.  
The sending out of the "seventy others" as recorded in Luke, would seem to us today to be too simple, and yet the fact is they were sent by the Master himself, and He it was who gave the directions, "Carry neither purse nor scrip, nor shoes." They were instructed to call at such houses as would receive them "and in the same house remain, eating and drinking such things as they give; for the laborer is worthy of his hire."  
One could hardly expect that the custom of the East could be made to apply to this continent; those seventy workers were missionaries of a new belief; it was necessary for them to move from place to place; weather conditions also permitted it, and in that country to this-day it is not unusual to entertain the stranger who calls at the home and asks a meal or a bed.  
So it is that churches have had to work out their own plan, and it does seem in contradiction of all the beliefs and teachings of any Christian church that the seal of financial approval should rest with such emphasis on the services of ministers in some of the larger churches, while those in the so-called lesser places are so reduced in earning power that their salaries are not sufficient for decent living. The system is faulty no matter how you look at it.

## OVER-GOVERNED

(Whitby Gazette)  
The outstanding feature of the 1933 session of the Ontario legislature has been the redistribution bill, by which the number of seats in the legislature has been reduced from 112 to 90. This is a virtual recognition by the government that this province has had too many legislators, and while the actual cash saving will not be great, the moral effect of this change is bound to be substantial.  
In spite of this reduction, Ontario is still over-governed. In fact, that can be applied to the whole of Canada. The average rural village, for instance, has its township council, its representatives on the county council, its legislative member and its member in the federal house. It is subject to laws made by four separate legislative and administrative bodies. Cities and larger towns have their municipal council, and are also subject to the provincial and federal bodies.  
For a country of ten million people, we have governmental bodies which would suffice for a country of ten times that population. And the overhead cost of this over-governance is tremendous.  
Ontario has started something by reducing the legislature. Other governing bodies might well take an example from this and make their contributions, also to reducing the cost of government.

## WELL LOOKED AFTER

The big-wigs in the Ontario Highways Department are well looked after when they go out to lecture on good roads and to try to convince members of county councils that they should continue paving work in those years when a large percentage of farmers are being taxed off their farms. The garage-foreman has a nice cushy job at \$2,700 a year. He has 11 assistants, the pay of 10 of them being \$1,600 a year and the other \$1,400. The auto repairer pulls down \$1,600 a year and the attendant, with no layoffs for lack of work, receives \$1,400 per annum with no cut. The gas and oil for the highwaymen's machines amounted to \$17,933.29. The bills for cleaning the chauffeurs' uniforms after they had cared for the cars provided by the province were \$66.19. It's great to be drawing a government salary. Why don't some of our export car drivers who are not getting steady work go after some of these sure salary jobs?
