There were six appeals dealt with, two of which were allowed, and four others dismissed. The C.N.R. appealed on the acreage, and lost out, but on an appeal against numbers of miles of telegraph wire on which they are assessed, it was reduced from 13 to 10 miles. The other appeals were not large.

COURT OF REVISION MARKHAM TOWNSHIP HAS FEW APPEALS

Few were the complaints against the 1933 assessment of Markham Township which the Township Council disposed of in a Court of Revision at Unionville. Those that did appeal were mostly of the minor type. The reason possibly for the small number of appeals was due to the fact that the assessors reduced somewhat the assessment of most properties. On the west side a total reduction of about \$125,000 was made being spread over that part of the township laying west of the sixth concession.

The appeals that were handed in were from:
Mr. Frank Harvey, of Unionville, Grist Mill, complained his business tax was too high, his total assessment being \$1,600. Court granted him \$100 off.

The land of Mrs. Wm. Pingle, in Unionville, which has been assessed at \$300, was cut in half. There are no buildings of any kind on the property, which contains about one acre and Reeve Padget figured that \$150 was plenty for it.

Mr. Gersham Size, Unionville, was reduced \$100 on buildings, which makes his assessment on same \$400.

Mr. Ross Nichols, Con. 4, Lot 22, was reduced \$100 on land and \$100 on buildings.

There were a few other appeals, which were not allowed.

With all appeals filed the court adjourned and met as a council for general business. The minutes of the previous meeting were read also a number of communications were disposed of.

On the west side of the Township Assessor Flett stated that there were at least a hundred dogs running at large which he was unable to tag. In most cases where these animals harbor, the owner has been, or is, on relief at some time or other. Councillor Clark said that 100 dogs could do considerable damage to a flock of sheep. The council passed a resolution authorizing the constable to collect these fees or destroy the dogs.

The resolutions passed were:
That the assessors be authorized to notify the constable of the owners of dogs whose tax is unpaid and the constable to collect the tax or destroy the dogs.

That in the opinion of this council the rate of interest on money borrowed from the Bank of Commerce by this municipality, dating from May 1st, 1933, be reduced to (5%) five per cent per annum.

That when this council adjourns it stands adjourned to meet on Monday, June 5th, at 1 p.m.
