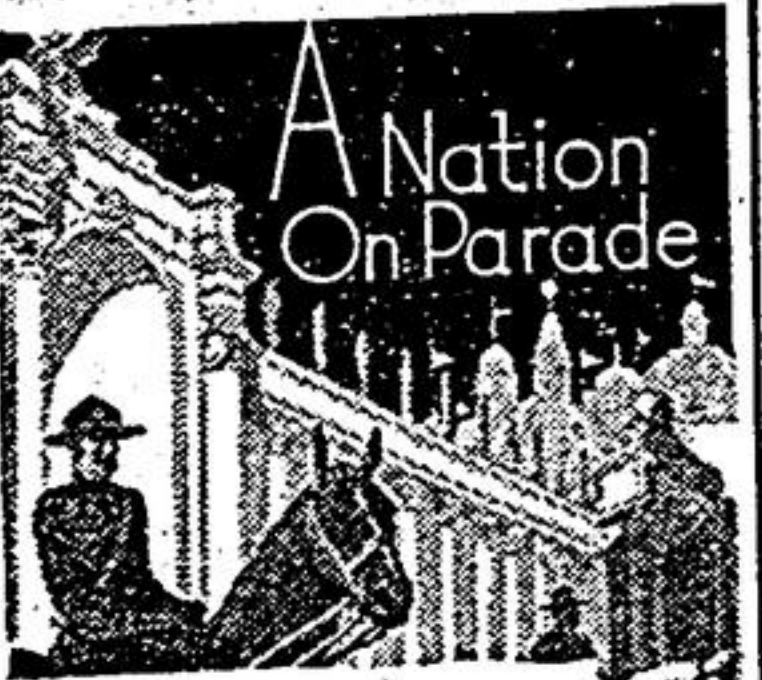

Pocket Camera To Take "Movies"

Latest Photographic Invention—Pictures Magnified 42,800 Times

London, Eng.—A moving picture film twenty-six times smaller than a postage stamp, which can be magnified for showing on a normal-size home screen, was demonstrated for the first time before a number of film experts in London recently.

The "silver grains" of microscopic size with which these films are coated, and which are the secret of the invention, were discovered accidentally by a research worker at the Kodak works at Harrow.

This invention has enabled the Kodak Company to produce a new home cine camera which can be carried in the pocket, while the twenty-five feet of film in the camera will take 4,000 pictures.

Lineman Lives After 6,000 Volts

Sydney, N.S.—Six thousand volts of electricity were shot through Jack Grant's body but he still lived.

Grant was working as a lineman at the steel plant when he contacted the high voltage wire. Foreman George Doherty went to his rescue and managed to pull him clear of the wire. Both men were badly burned about the wrists and hands but otherwise unharmed.

Jerusalem Notes

Uses Water Freely
The average daily consumption of water in Tel Aviv, which was founded twenty-five years ago on the sand dunes outside Jaffa, and now has a population of 65,000, is higher per capita than in London. As against 150 liters a day, rising to 250 liters in summer per person in Tel Aviv, the London figure is said to be 140. Water consumption in Jerusalem is only 45 liters a day, less than a third of Tel Aviv's figure, due to the inadequacy of Jerusalem's water supply which makes strict rationing essential. While the population of Tel Aviv is growing rapidly, and Haifa is also developing, there is a movement away from the ancient capital. This tendency toward a decrease in the Jewish population of the Holy City is being largely blamed on the perennial water shortage.

Timber Needed
The extent to which Palestine had been denuded of its forests in past centuries is being increasingly felt with the growing demand for timber for orange boxes, buildings, furniture manufacture and other comparatively young industries. During 1932, "forest produce," including manufactures, was imported to the amount of £423,000. The Government is doing its best toward reforestation, having planted 744,000 tree seedlings during the past year. In addition, it distributed 103,000 trees for amenity purposes. Olive trees were planted in 1932 by cultivators to the number of 122,000. Some ninety-three plantations, covering 350 acres, were started by the Jewish National Fund.

New Air Line

The Dutch Government has acquired a plot of land for the construction of an airfield near Jerusalem, which will be a station on the Holland-Java air route. Establishment of an air service from Poland to Palestine is being considered in Warsaw at the suggestion of the Palestine-Poland Chamber of Commerce. There is a possibility that the existing Poland-Salonica line will be extended to Palestine, or alternatively, that a connection will be established with existing British and other lines. An argument in favor of the new air line is that Palestine takes second place in the list of countries exchanging mail with Poland.

Old Temple Unearthed

A discovery of considerable historical value has been made in the village of Salhieh, near Damascus, where a Jewish temple dating from the first century has been brought to light in the course of excavations by the Franco-American Archaeological Mission, under the direction of Count Dommest and Mr. Hopkins. The mission has been working in this village for several years and this is the oldest discovery made up to the moment. The walls of the temple are decorated with mosaics depicting the exodus of the Jews from Egypt until their arrival in the Promised Land.

Sericulture Promoted

The Government Sericulture Service, established in 1928 for the encouragement of silk worm breeding in Palestine, has assisted in the planting of 87,000 mulberry trees. Mulberry seedlings, implements and silk-worm eggs are distributed free, and advice extended to interested persons, schools and institutions. Two model mulberry plantations have been organized and sericulture and silk reeling have been introduced in government schools. Research work is in progress to determine the varieties of mulberries and silk worms most suited to local conditions. The planting of mulberry trees on an extensive scale is considered the first essential for the promotion of sericulture on a commercial basis in Palestine. The first attempt in modern times to reintroduce the ancient silk industry into Palestine was made thirty-five years ago under the auspices of Baron de Rothchild, who built a filature at Rosh Pinah.

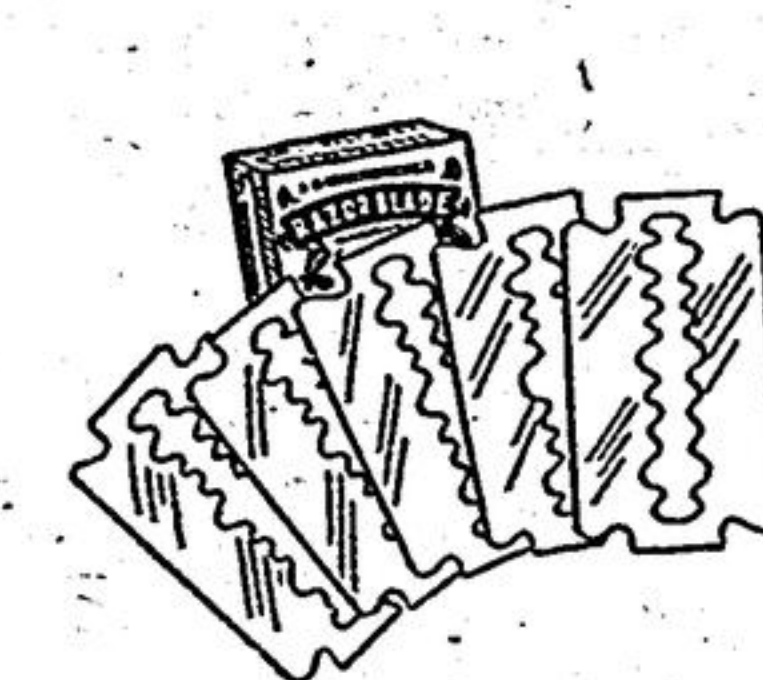
Canada's Tree Sparrow Studied by Student

Winnipeg.—Miss A. M. Heydweiller, Cornell University student of ornithology, knows all about the home life of the tree sparrow in the frozen tundra lands of Canada's far north. She left here for Chicago en route home with full data and photographs she collected in two months' close observation of the birds at Churchill, newest Canadian port on Hudson Bay.

The birds Miss Heydweiller will write about in her doctorate thesis at Cornell, become amusingly tame when they leave southern Manitoba to raise their young in the north country, she reported. She had a number of pairs of birds under observation from the time nesting began until the young hatched and the fledglings left the nest. Banding experiments she carried out at the University last winter round out a complete picture of the sparrows' life and habits.

Tonnage Increases

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.—Tonnage passing through American and Canadian locks in July was 6,047,473, an increase of more than 100 per cent. over June. It is announced here. Eastbound tonnage was more than double the westbound, with 4,291,059 tons going east and 1,756,420 west. Canadian tonnage was 311,085. There were 3,000 passengers on boats, a high mark for the year. Wheat, grain other than wheat, and iron ore led the list, followed by general merchandise, copper, pig iron, flour, lumber and stone.

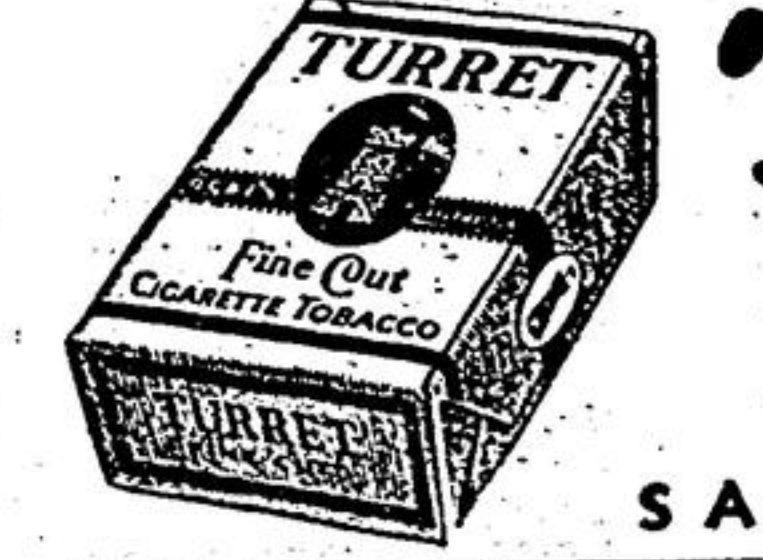

News Tit-Bits Across Canada

Canadian Preferred

A contract for one stationary air compressor was awarded recently to the Ingersoll, Rand Co. Ltd., of Toronto, despite the fact that the company's tender was \$60 in excess of the lowest figure. It was agreed that it was advantageous to award business to a Canadian firm, which will manufacture the entire product in the Dominion.

Must Work

Under the new Manitoba Relief Commission, all physically fit single men, who have been on relief more than three months without doing any work, will be required to go to work camps. Their stay at the work camp will be for three months and they will be allowed food, shelter and clothes and \$5 per month. Physically unfit single relief recipients will continue on relief as heretofore.

New Stamp Issue

To commemorate the hundredth anniversary of the departure from Picton, N.S., of the first Canadian Steamship to make a trans-Atlantic trip, the postal department of Canada will issue a special stamp. On Aug. 17, 1933, the Royal William set out from Picton to cross the Atlantic under her own steam, making the journey in 21 days. The stamps will be issued shortly.

Circulation Down

Lindsay.—Circulation at the Lindsay Public Library showed a slight decrease for the month of July from the previous month of June. The total number of books distributed in the month was 4,811, as against 4,962 for June. These were made up of 3,319 adults fiction, 256 adults non-fiction, 618 juvenile fiction and 118 juvenile non-fiction.

87 Below

Calgary.—A height of nine miles and a temperature of 87 degrees below zero is the record so far attained by meteorological balloons released from Calgary by Captain C. H. Bromley, in connection with the polar year tests.

Receives Medal

Calgary.—Dr. C. A. Zavitz, former head of the field husbandry department of the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph, Ont., has been awarded one of two medals given annually by the Canadian Seed Growers' Association for consistent contribution to the production of pure seed grain.

Cheap Going

Tilbury.—Travelling at an average cost of a tenth-of-a-cent a mile, two Tilbury Boy Scouts, George Escott and Robert Adams, recently completed a 3,000-mile hitch-hiking trip to Halifax and back.

Lives Up to Name

Extension of the arrangement with the Samaritan Club, of Toronto, to March 31, 1934, whereby the club looks after the care and rehabilitation of certain men discharged from sanitarium who would otherwise have to be sent to one of the city hostels, has been authorized by the Board of Control. Dr. G. P. Jackson, medical officer of health, stated that "the facilities afforded by the Samaritan Club have been most welcome and have filled a much-needed want." Terms of the extension are to be the same as before, 80 cents per diem charges, and limited to a maximum of 10 cases at any one time.

Conscience Money

Because a Brockville, Ont., resident was smitten by his conscience, the Saskatchewan Treasury is to-day richer by \$9. The cash was attached to the following note: "Enclosed please find \$9 which I feel I never earned. In 1919 I was in Saskatchewan and received remuneration for some work on the prairies. 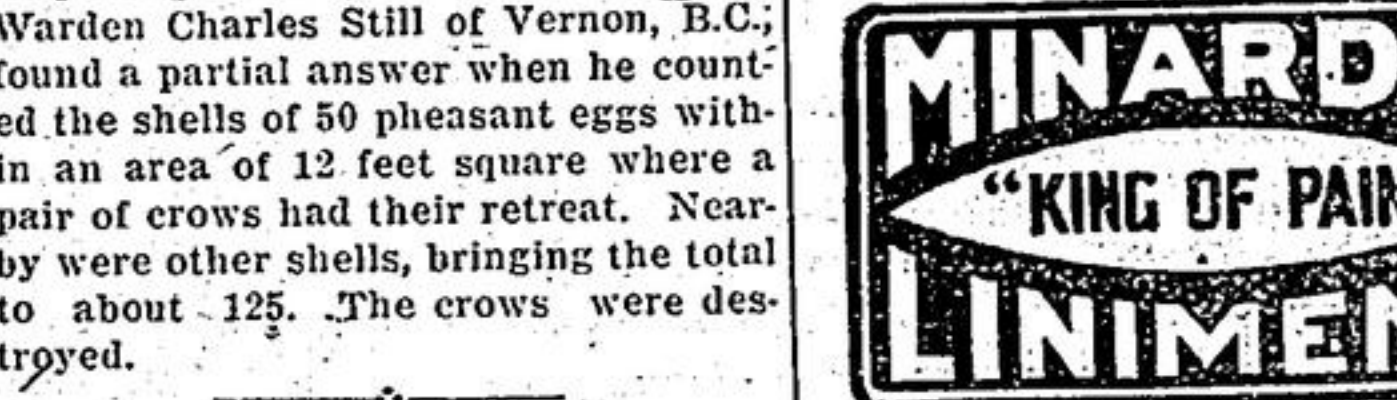

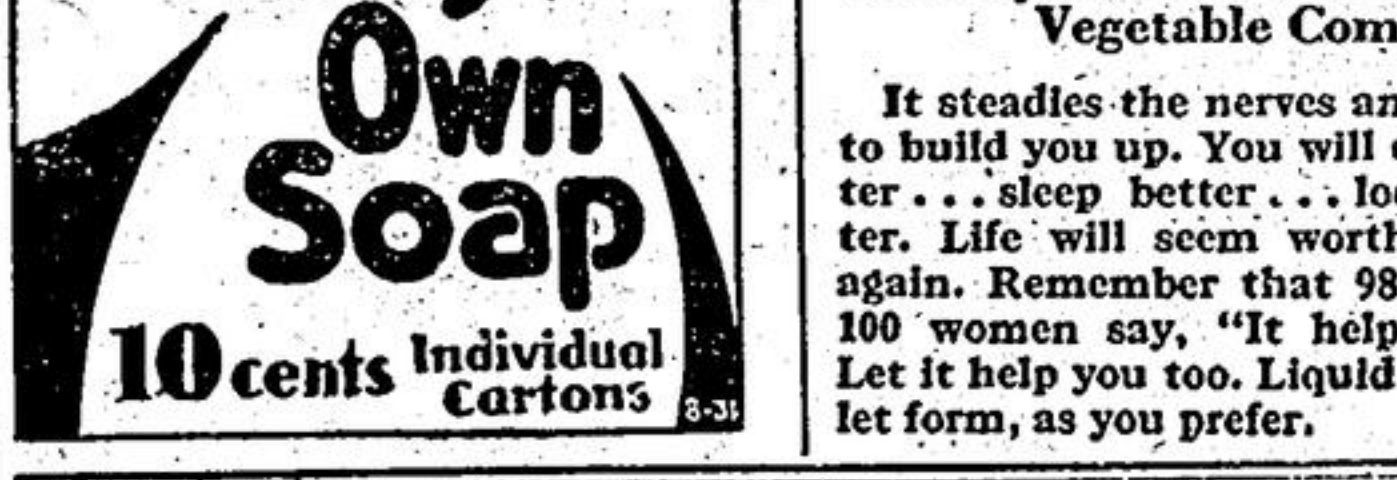
