GRAVE CATTLE SITUATION AT TORONTO YARD

Packers Buying Direct Menace Farmers' Interest, Co-op. Writes Bennett

Direct buying of cattle by packers and truckers from growers is attacked by the United Farmers Co-operative Company in a resolution unanimously passed at a meeting of the board of directors in Toronto, Friday last. The resolution will be forwarded to the Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime Minister of Canada. The board complains that no serious attention has been given to the protests already made to the federal minister of agriculture and to the provincial government.

Nationalization?
A number of the board are in favor of the nationalization of the stock yards, and all support the regulating of livestock marketing to ensure that all lines are handled through the stock yards, in place of direct purchase. It is believed that packers are paying truckers to bring cattle direct from the farm. Heavy carryovers in the past weeks have seriously affected the prices paid to growers.

Situation Grave
The resolution of the board was based upon a unanimous report of the livestock committee of the United Farmers Co-operative, of which H. A. Gilroy, Alvington is chairman, and R. H. Halbert, Uxbridge, and R. A. Alcheson, Chatsworth, are members. The report stated that the committee found "a condition of a very grave character" at the West Toronto market, and that the practice of packers buying from direct shippers is to be deplored.

Demonstration Woodlots

The Ontario Forestry branch is attempting to interest farmers in growing woodlots on their farms. Officials of the Department are co-operating with the owners, in order that intensive forestry will be practised, and it is hoped that they will show owners of these lots, a more profitable and better method of management.

Three woodlots in Markham township have been chosen as demonstrations. Robert Armstrong on No. 7 highway, W. H. Johnson on 7th line and George Hoshel on 2nd line.

It is hoped that these practical demonstrations will show farmers better and more profitable methods of management. These woodlots were chosen because they were adjacent to the road and could be improved by thinnings.

A well stocked woodlot is considered an asset to a farm and farmers would be well advised to plan to keep a percentage of their holdings in woodland. Most farmers plan to grow vegetables, apples, small fruits and potatoes for their own use so why should they not also plan to grow sufficient trees to furnish fuelwood and timber for buildings?

There are other reasons why there should be scattered woodland in farming districts as it has a beneficial effect on living conditions and other crops. There are also types of land such as steep hillsides, sandy, rocky, shallow and swamp soils, that should be growing trees. They will not give adequate financial returns if cropped or pastured but generally they will grow trees.

There are many different methods being practised in farmers' woodlots, and there is no recognized best plan to grow trees as there are with other crops. There are certain recognized practices however and on which a bulletin is issued by the Department free to anyone.
