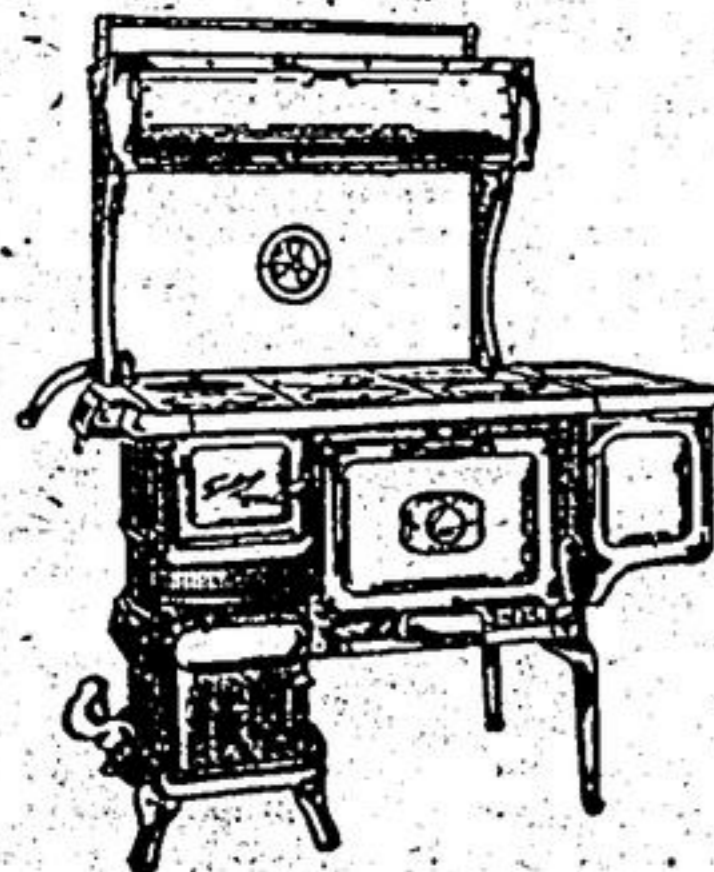

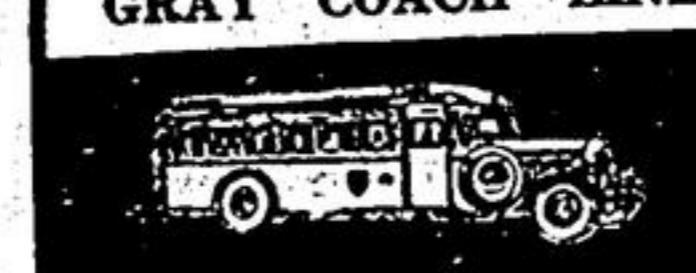

Special music was furnished by the home choir in the morning, assisted by Mr. Doan, of Queensville, Stouffville United Church choir in the afternoon, and the home choir at night.

Mr. Bert Silverthorne has been seriously ill at the home of his mother on the 10th concession of Markham, and grave doubts were held out for some time for his recovery. He is now improved however, and is considered out of the danger stage. Flu with complications setting in is the cause of his illness. It is just ten weeks ago since his father, the late F. W. Silverthorne, passed away in such a brief illness.

Evangelistic meetings in charge of two happy women evangelists opened in the Mennonite church on Sunday evening with a burst of enthusiasm. Every available pew, was filled and extra seating was added to take in the audience seeking admission. The young ladies, Miss Yeo and Miss Snider are both capable speakers and singers, with winning personalities, and these qualifications, coupled with convincing messages from the scriptures, will undoubtedly make a deep impression on Stouffville. There will be meetings every evening at 8 o'clock, and the regular Sunday services, all in charge of the evangelists.

One of our Ringwood citizens grew some peanuts this summer, a sample of which was brought in to the Tribune office by Rev. E. Morton this week. The peanut vine resembles the vine of the common garden bean, and this one had a dozen or more peanuts hanging to it. Down in Southern Carolina where Mr. Morton spent part of his boyhood days, peanuts are a big crop, but they are known there as "Gauber Peas." If we remember correctly, this same Ringwood locality boasts of having a lemon tree which bears fruit every other year. Now with a peanut crop, Ringwood is surely emulating the Sunny South.

A law that is being broken almost every day in Stouffville, according to our information, is that respecting the sale of cigarettes and tobacco to minors. Prosecutions have been going on in other municipalities for selling cigarettes to boys and girls under age, and if what our informant tells us is correct, its about time someone was made an example of in this village. For the guidance of those who do not know, here is the regulations on the matter: "No person can legally sell, or give or furnish, directly or indirectly, cigarettes or cigarette papers or tobacco in any form, to any boy or girl under the age of 18 years. The onus of proving the age is on the Dealer, his clerk, servant or agent."

The following exception to above regulation is, "When a boy or girl has a written order signed by their parent or guardian, but no one else, dated and stating the kind and quantity of tobacco required. Also this written order must accompany every individual purchase."

## Clergyman Accused of Running Lottery

Were Selling Tickets for "Draw", Winner to Receive Automobile

As a sequel to running an alleged lottery, Rev. A. W. Downer, of Epiphany Anglican church, Scarborough, Samuel Davis and his son, George, of Kennedy Road, will appear in police court. The trial will be held as a test case.

According to Toronto police, Morality Officer, Jackson approached an automobile parked near the city hall Friday, containing the three men. The officer said he would like to buy a ticket on the "draw." He exchanged 25 cents with one of the men in the car and was given a pasteboard in return, which entitled the bearer to admittance to a dance to be held on November 3, in Scarborough and an opportunity to win an automobile.

On receiving the "draw" ticket, Jackson presented his police badge and informed the three men that they were running a lottery and that they would have to accompany him and his fellow officer, Sunderland, to headquarters.

The automobile, which was to have been presented to the winner of the "draw," was placed under seizure and taken to police central garage. At headquarters, the men wanted to know why they had been brought to headquarters. On being informed that they were running a lottery, contrary to the criminal code, they told the officers that they were not aware of the fact that they were doing anything illegal.

The clergyman said they had already sold in the neighborhood of 3,500 tickets at 25 cents each. A large sign attached to the roof of the auto, reading, "Win This Car" was also seized and is being held as evidence.

When taken to headquarters the three men had in their possession about 500 lottery tickets as well as other literature.
