Provincial Plowing

Stouffville plowmen made their usual good showing at the Provincial Plowing Match held near Owen Sound this month. A feature of the match this year was the determination of the judges not to consider any contestants who failed to do their plowing in the allotted time, and this caused some thirty plowmen to be disqualified in one day's contest. Other plowmen who found themselves cramped for time, broke into high speed when they ran their teams in an effort to finish in the money. This feature is a bone of contention at nearly all matches. From 15,000 to 20,000 spectators were present on some days of the week.

The result of Wednesday's plowing awarded Elgin Walker of Markham twp. second prize in class 1 tractor, and Harry Pugh of Stouffville 4th.

In the first class for those who have never won a prize in the class, D. J. Tran of Claremont R.R. finish fifth in a large field. His young son Joe entered the class for boys under 18 and came fourth. Joe also carried off the Kiwanis trophy for boys under sixteen years, showing the best work with single plow.

In third class open to those who had never won a prize James Clark of Gormley was one of the winners.

Fred Timbers made a great win on Friday when he won first in the tractor class five. Earlier in the week Win Timbers carried off first in class 5 high cut with team.



Instructions to Turnip Growers

Dear Sir:—

The writer takes this opportunity to ask your co-operation in the matter of harvesting and handling your turnip crop this season.

We would impress on your mind the fact that we are very fortunate in our locality, in having a very good run of turnips, both as regards turnout and good quality.

This condition of turnips does not prevail by any means throughout our Province, for in many of the main shipping centres of Western Ontario, they are possessed with little or no turnips at all.

While it would be folly on the part of anyone to predict or to guarantee any definite figures for the high market price which may later prevail, it can safely be said that all holders of good turnips will be more than pleased with later returns for this crop.

Pull your turnips by hand, top them carefully with a knife. (not too large a knife works much better,) cut tops off so as to leave from 1/4 to 1/2 inch of neck, but do not cut into body of turnips. Clean off all roots but do not cut tap root to short, and do not load turnips by picking same up with the prong of fork which only destroys the flesh.

We will be pleased to handle all turnips harvested according to the plan suggested about, but we positively cannot handle any roots taken out by the old careless method of the harrows and pitch fork.
