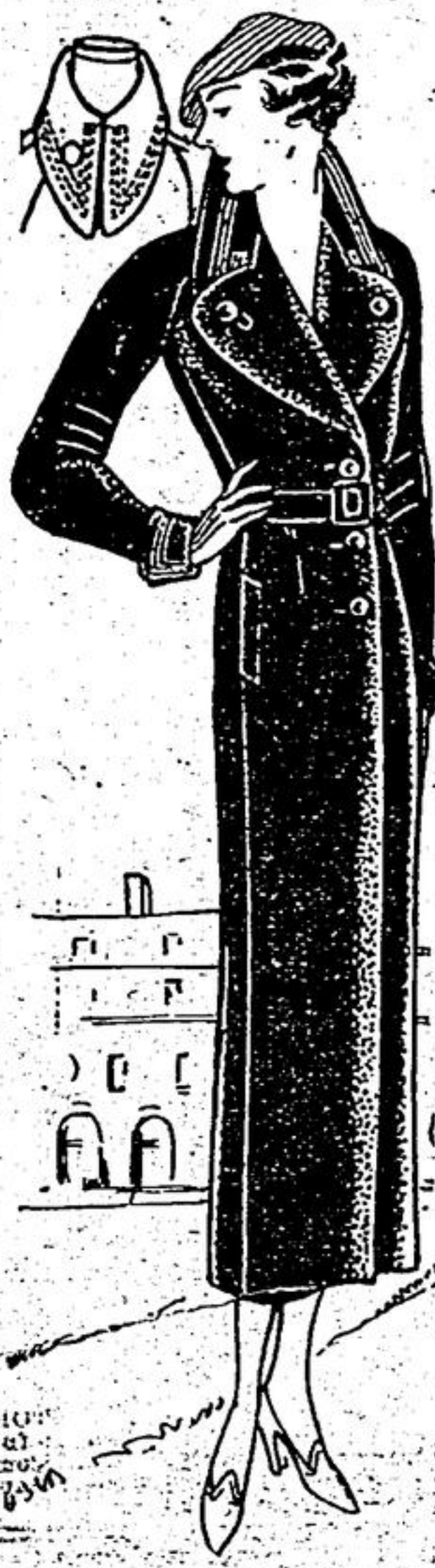

Junior Farmers

Approximately 300 people, including 150 competitors, representing all rural sections of the County attended the second annual Programme Competition put on by the York County Junior Farmers and Junior Institutes. The Competition was held at Pickering College on Friday evening, March 2nd.

Five Clubs competed, representing the communities of Unionville, Vellore, Mt. Albert, Victoria Square and Nobleton. Each Club had the privilege of contributing six numbers to the programme. Entries were grouped in six classes with a club scoring five points for first prize, down to one point for fifth prize.

Unionville, for the second consecutive year was the winner of the Inter-Club Shield. This Club stood first in five classes and second in one, giving them a total score of twenty-nine points. Vellore Club was a close second with twenty-three points.

The musical numbers were judged by Miss Emily Todd, Supervisor of Music Dept. of Education, Miss Crawford, Dept. of Education, and Mr. Aubrey Bailey, Newmarket. The judges of Public Speaking were H.A. Jackson, Principal, Stuart Scott, D.O. Mungovan, English Instructor, Newmarket High School, and W. Adams, English Instructor, Aurora High School. Miss Todd in announcing the awards and making criticisms of the various numbers, congratulated the York County Juniors on their accomplishment. She stated that many of the numbers ranked with the best she had ever judged outside the city of Toronto. Mr. Jackson who announced the results of the Public Speaking, complimented the boys on the high standing of their public speaking and stated that it rated with the best of their high school competitions.

Mr. R. E. White as Chairman and Mr. Murray Macklin as President of the County Junior Farmers expressed themselves as more than pleased with the programme put on wholly by the rural groups.
