Hon. Mr. Stevens is doing work in "taking the lids off garbage cans" but getting rid of the garbage is a far more different job.

With the C.N.R. running behind at the rate of over a million dollars a month, not much can be done about the dilapidated and shabby-looking condition of the local depot. With the residence unoccupied and the paint falling off the station, the premises present a non-cared-for appearance.

Members of the Curling Club were given another thriller on the ice last week, as the weather stiffened up so as to enable them to throw the granite rocks end to end, or from circle to circle, without any great effort. However, the closed season is at hand for this sport and Old Saul will see to that.

In spite of all the enormous cost of the last war, in anguish and in treasure, the net results of the conflict were—exactly nothing of any value. And nobody won that war—neither Germany nor the allies. They called it a "war to end wars," and in that belief parents were encouraged to give sons to the cause. And now the statesmen are talking of another war, as sabres are rattled and bayonets are whetted. If only there were just a little common sense in the chancelleries of earth.

The village of Mildmay, near Walkerton has been forced to do without its customary domestic water supply. A serious leak in the mains was discovered and repaired, but the Gazette says the situation is no better. The village council met and decided that something must be done to improve the supply so soon as spring breaks up. Very good, we say, but in the meantime how about a little drink and a bath?

The town of Aurora has engaged a firm of accountants to audit their books in future at a cost of \$400 per year. Tenders were received from \$600 to \$200, but surely the lowest of them is very high, otherwise Stouffville, Whitechurch and Uxbridge Township get their books audited very cheaply, at from \$10 to \$25. And none of these places have ever had a finger pointed at them for defaultations, or other charges of mismanagement. It does not seem to us necessary that such big money need be paid for auditing the books of small municipalities.

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HYDRO SALARIES NOT HIT BY DEPRESSION

Salaries of Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commissioners and executive heads have been released by Hon. J. R. Cooke, chairman, to T. J. Hannigan, secretary of the Ontario Municipal Electric Association, in reply to a request.

The total salaries paid by the commission in 1933 were \$188,589, while the salaries for 1934 will be \$186,652, a decrease of approximately \$2,000.

Since 1926 total salaries amounted to \$191,733, while in 1932 they rose to \$194,325.74.

Chief Engineer F. A. Gaby's salary for 1933 was \$29,726, which included \$5,000 paid by the northern districts. In 1932 Mr. Gaby's salary was \$31,694 and 1934 \$29,070. According to the statement, Mr. Gaby didn't receive any remuneration from the northern districts in 1932.

Water rentals paid by the commission to the Provincial Government are \$355,466 and to the Dominion Government \$239,880, or a total of \$595,346.

THE LAW ON SWEEPSTAKES AND LOTTERY CARS

Although three automobiles have been given away in Stouffville on draws there has never been any difficulty in the lucky drawer driving home his prize and retaining it. There is, however, a grave possibility of one losing the prize, if it was contested by someone willing to inform in an official way.

Just how considerable interest is being aroused by the introduction of a bill to authorize sweepstakes in Canada, and which has been approved by the senate but opposed by the House of Commons. The law on the matter is recently published by a Winnipeg lawyer who is qualified to speak on the subject probably more than any other man, because he has made the matter a great study. Three posers have been put to him, and here is the official interpretation:

"1. Suppose I won in the Sweepstake this coming race, what is necessary for a winner to do so that no one can claim your winnings?"

"2. If a person has it put in one of the Banks in England, is that sufficient to keep any one from informing on you?"

"3. Could a winner go home to England and bring back with him or her the money?"

"4. Could the Government make you pay income tax on this money?"

"5. Could anyone else claim it after six months if you placed it in a Canadian Bank?"

The law dealing with sweepstakes is contained in the Criminal Code of Canada and reads as follows: "Every one is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to two years' imprisonment and to a fine not exceeding two thousand dollars who— (a) make, prints, advertises or publishes, or causes or procures to be made, printed, advertised or published, any proposal, scheme or plan for advancing, lending, giving, selling or in any way disposing of any property, by lots, cards, tickets or any mode of chance whatsoever; or (b) sells, barter, exchanges or otherwise disposes of, or causes, or procures or aids or assists in, the sale, barter, exchange or other disposal of, or offers for sale, barter or exchange, any lot, card, ticket or other means or device or advancing, lending, giving, selling or otherwise disposing of any property, by lots, tickets, or any mode of chance whatsoever; or (c) conducts or manages any scheme, contrivance or operation of any kind for the purpose of determining who, or the holders of what lots, tickets, numbers or chances, are the winners of any property so proposed to be advanced, loaned, given, sold or disposed of."

"Everyone is guilty of an offence and liable on summary conviction to a penalty of twenty dollars, who buys, takes or receives any such lot, ticket or other device as aforesaid."

"Every sale, loan, gift, barter or exchange of any property, by any lottery, ticket, card or other mode of chance depending upon or to be determined by chance or lot, is void, and all property so sold, lent, given, bartered or exchanged, is liable to be forfeited to any person who sues for the same by action or information in any court of competent jurisdiction."


"No such forfeiture shall affect any right or title to such property acquired by any bona fide purchaser for valuable consideration without notice."

"This section includes the printing or publishing, or causing to be printed or published, of any advertisement, scheme, proposal or plan of any foreign lottery, and the sale or offer for sale of any ticket, chance or share, in any such lottery, or the advertisement for sale of such ticket, chance or share, and the conducting or managing of any such scheme, contrivance or operation for determining the winners in any such lottery."

- The answers to the above enquiry are:
1. Have a friend start a friendly action as an informer.
 2. No.
 3. Yes, but you would still be liable to an action.
 4. No, but any returns from the money received, such as bank interest, dividends on stocks purchased with the money, etc., is taxable.
 5. Yes, if they start action.

Here and There

A. C. Leighton, R.B.A., president of the Government Art College at Calgary, will again hold his summer art school for selected art students from the province of Alberta at the Kananaskis Dude Ranch near Banff, Alta. Mr. Leighton, who is a grand nephew of the late Lord Leighton, president of the British Academy from 1878 to 1896, has been painting for years at Banff and through the Canadian Rockies. He is also head of the Institute of Technology and Art in connection with the University of Alberta. The Kananaskis Dude Ranch operated by Mrs. Bill Brewster, is well known throughout Canada and the United States, and is surrounded by the most magnificent of Canadian Rocky Mountain scenery.

Governor Frank Murphy, of the Philippine Islands, was the guest of Commodore R. G. Latta, of the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Britain, at Manila on March 15. Governor Murphy inspected the liner, which is engaged on her annual Round the World cruise, and wished Commodore Latta and his ship many happy returns to Manila.

Captain Cyril D. Neroutsos, for many years Manager of the British Columbia Coast Boat Steamship service of the Canadian Pacific Railway, relinquishes his duties on April 1st under the provisions of the Company's retirement regulations. Connecting sailings from Canada for the three cruises are the Empress of Australia from Quebec June 21, the Duchess of Atholl from Montreal July 6, and the Duchess of York from Montreal July 20.
