## Brilliant Social Season Expected in "Dear Old London"

London.—The most brilliant social season since the world war was ushered in recently with the opening of the opera at Covent Garden before a house packed with bejewelled women and scores of the aristocracy.

Hundreds stood in line all day long to obtain tickets in the gallery to witness both the spectacle of society on opening-night and the opera on the stage.

The season continued with the Royal Academy exhibition on May 7th, followed by a swift succession of social events. Highlights include the Ascot and Goodwood race meets; the Royal Henley Regatta yachting week the Richmond-Horse Show, the Eton and Harrow Schools' annual cricket match at Lord's and the Wimbledon tennis fortnight.

As a background for all these functions are the traditional four courts at Buckingham Palace in May and June, when the King and Queen receive debutantes and many others of the socially elite from numerous other countries who are lucky enough to be invited.

## Wool Industry Records High Level in Years

The wool industry of Australia has witnessed one of the most complete instances of price recovery in the history of that industry. Prices, recovered to such a degree that they reached the highest level since the 1928-29 season. Over 60 per cent of the wool which will be available this season has been sold at an average advance in prices of 80 per cent as compared with the previous year's clip. Much of the wool reaching Canada is carried in Canadian Steamships vessels which provide direct service between Canada Australia and New Zealand.

## Call for Canned Peas in Canada

Until recent years most of the domestic requirements for canned peas were supplied by Ontario, or by importation from Europe, but Quebec and British Columbia have established and expanded in output rapidly. In 1921 the recorded acreage of canning peas was 2,202 acres in Ontario. In 1931, Ontario had 9,385 acres; Quebec 3,161 acres; British Columbia 418, and small acreages in other provinces brought the total to 13,243 acres. In the past year or two, imports of this product had been negligible and the Canadian pack is finding export markets as a result of its high quality. Exports amounted to 31,341 cases in the 1932 crop season, practically to Empire markets.—The Agricultural Situation Bulletin.

Day and Evening Classes Theoretical and Practical Instruction is given in various trades. The schools and classes are under the direction of an Advisory Committee.

Commercial Subjects, Manual Training, Household Science and Agriculture and Horticulture are provided for in the Courses of Study in Public, Separate, Continuation and High Schools, Collegiate Institutes, Vocational Schools and Departments.

Copies of the Regulations issued by the Minister of Education may be obtained from the Deputy Minister, Parliament Buildings Toronto.

Application for attendance should be made to the Principal of the School.

## Smokers Pay Canada \$24,524,362 Duties

OTTAWA—Consumption of Canadian cigarettes increased during the past fiscal year. The total entered for consumption for the first 11 months of the past year was 4,017,674-355, according to a return tabled in the House of Commons. For the entire fiscal year 1932-33 the total was 3,728,832,059.

Smokers in Canada altogether paid into the revenues of the Dominion during the 11 months of the past year \$24,524,362 as imposts on tobacco in its various forms, with the duties on cigarettes supplying about two-thirds of this total.

Cigars seemed to be slipping in popularity. During the 11 months of last year the total was 107,140,045. While this approximated the number for the 12 months 1932-33, when the total was 119,097,104, back in 1919-20 the total was 273,555,046.

## Relief Given Little Fellow

U. S. Tax Bill Best Since 1924 For Farmers Of Small Incomes

Washington—Not since 1924 has the small taxpayer had such relief as would pay under the Senate and House schedules compared with the present law and payments ten years ago: Present law \$20, House \$8, Senate \$8.80; 1924 \$7.50.

The tax paid in 1924 on 1923 income was given a credit of 25 per cent.

In 1913, 1914, 1915, and 1916 there was no tax at all on a net income of the above type. In 1918, it was \$60; 1919 and 1920, \$40; 1921 and 1922, \$20, and 1923, \$15.

## Tails Removed

The current issue of the British Medical Journal Cities two cases of babies born during the month of January with tails.

The first baby, not related to the second, was discovered to have at its birth, a tail not unlike that of a pig. It was about three inches long. X-ray revealed it to be of a non-bony structure. The appendage was successfully removed by operation when the baby was five weeks old.

The second baby had a short fleshy tail, highly sensitive which was also removed.

## Argentina Improving Fruit-Export Quality

Buenos Aires.—Efforts to raise the standard of Argentine fruit exports to United States and British requirements resulted in the destruction of 17,000 tons of fruit in the first quarter of 1934, pure food inspectors revealed.

Shippers' profits were increased 70 per cent by tightening the regulations, it was estimated, through elimination of losses through deterioration. Grape exports, however, jumped from 222,735 cases in the first three months of 1933 to 408,547 cases in the like period of 1934.

Farmers in the North of England are turning from ploughing to dairying and farms of from 50 to 75 acres are in demand.
