"Isles of Rest" Veto Bill for Daylight Saving Time—Red Chamber Objects

HAMILTON, Bermuda.—The rest of the world can get up an hour earlier and yawn all day if they want to but Bermudians have no desire for daylight saving time, according to members of the Legislative Council who turned down the bill amending the Time Zone Act, giving it "six months' hold."

Speaking against the bill, Hon. F. G. Gosling said that Bermuda, was situated roughly about half way between the latitude of London and the latitude of countries to the south. In London, daylight saving might be beneficial, but in countries where there was an excessive amount of sun it was found necessary to declare a siesta in the middle of the day.

TRAVEL IMPRESSIONS

Markets of London

Many incidents occur in the course of travel: unexpected happenings that give zest to your trip. Perhaps the best of these are the trivial things that you stumble upon, but in which there is much of human interest. A sojourner in London, for instance, will—if he has eyes to see—find much that is uncommon. Whether it be a visit to Caledonian Market—the official name of which is the Metropolitan Cattle Market—or to Mid-dlesex Street—commonly known as Petticoat Lane—or to any one of the street markets, where from barrows at the side of the curb, every conceivable article is sold, you will meet queer characters and see strange sights in abundance. In other words, you are embarked upon a personal voyage of discovery.

Caledonian Market

Caledonian Market is the largest cattle market in the kingdom. Monday is market day and normal arrivals comprise about 1300 cattle and over 5000 sheep, sent from the pasture-lands of England, Scotland and on Tuesdays and Fridays, however, the great square is thrown open to pedlars who expose for sale, everything that can be paid for and taken away. On the pavement is spread a conglomeration of articles, small and large, that defies description: Books, pictures, hardware, clothing, old tyres (as the Englishman spells them), bric-a-brac, silverware, gold rings, tools, sporting goods, animals and birds—too many things to enumerate. At various places in the market are booths, where delicacies such as snails, winkles and eels are sold and the patrons of such booths sprinkle these with vinegar and eat them on the spot with much relish. A strange set of people congregate in and about the market; much good humour is exhibited and it is certainly an interesting cross-section of London life. There is an unwritten law concerning Caledonian Market—you must not enquire regarding the origin of anything exposed for sale; if you want it, have the money to pay for it and can take it away, ask no questions.

Petticoat Lane

The Sunday morning market that rejoices in the name of Petticoat Lane is located in and around Middlesex Street. A seething mass of humanity—as closely packed as an Exhibition—Midway crowd—on Labor Day—passes along the centre of the street, on each side of which there are stalls and barrows, closely set together and presided over by shouting salesmen and women who wish to draw attention to their wares. Here the articles are, for the most part, new but the variety of things being offered is as great as in the Caledonian Market. It is a veritable bedlam, and if you do not enjoy crowds, noise and excitement, stay away. In both places many bargains may be had if one is prepared to do a little dickering and put up with some bantering talk. All this adds to the enjoyment and I would personally advise anyone visiting London to go to one or other of these most intriguing spots.

Other Markets

Berwick Market in Soho is much patronized by the foreign element of London, and also, so far as millinery, furs and drapery is concerned, by the young ladies of London generally. It is also a street market, located not far from Piccadilly Circus, in the heart of London. Another curious Sunday morning market is the Rag

Fair in Bangor Street, Notting Dale, and for dogs, birds and other pets, there is Club Row at Shore-ditch. This is not far from Petticoat Lane; the market is also held on Sunday morning and terriers and other dogs may be purchased here, with pedigrees longer than any in Burke. The value of these pedigrees is, perhaps, another matter.

All these markets are touches of London behind the scenes. I haven't mentioned Billingsgate, the fish market; Covent Garden, the flower, fruit and vegetable market; Smithfield, the meat market, to say nothing of others of lesser importance.

Pin Punctures On Cardboard Test Eyesight

Science Proves Seeming Cases Of Dull Mentality Caused By Faulty Vision.

CAMBRIDGE—Eight pinholes in a piece of cardboard are proving that some cases of mental dullness are merely unsuspected poor eyesight. The pinholes form the crux of a new eye-testing device. They reveal how a visual image looks to the brain. When the image from each eye falls upon the retina, if sight is perfect, the two images appear to lie in absolute register; one directly on top of the other.

But actually the two images may have various differences: One may be wider than the other, or taller, or bigger in all dimensions, or smaller. The technical name for this condition

is dyslexia. It is sometimes exceedingly difficult to detect, particularly when the faulty image is wrong at only one angle, which may have any direction.

The new device has revealed cases of dyslexia in individuals whose eyesight had not been under suspicion. It is described to the American Association for the Advancement of Science by Walter F. Dearborn and Forrest D. Comfort, of Harvard University. They credit the pioneer work to Professor Ames and the staff of the Dartmouth Medical School.

The eight pinholes are set in a circle around a hole three-eighths of an inch in diameter. Behind the pinholes are a series of tiny lights and a series of black backgrounds.

These are arranged so that when a person looks at the large central hole his right eye sees the tiny lights behind the pinholes. But the left eye does not see these lights at all. Instead, it sees only the black backgrounds.

Dots and Light Displaced

The result is that one eye sees a hole surrounded by black dots, while the other sees the same hole surrounded by pinpoints of light. If vision is perfect the black dots and the glowing points superimpose and to the brain they appear to fuse.

But if there is any of the distortion of dyslexia, black dots and the bright points separate. They separate in the direction in which the vision is faulty whether it is at one angle or a general distortion.

Lenses are placed in front of the eyes until dots and points of lights fuse, and that gives the correct prescription for corrective eyeglasses. The troubles thus corrected include complaints of sleepiness when reading, words jumping about and blotting on a page and skipping of lines.

Unique Display Will Draw Crowds at CNE

Ceylon now joins numerous other far-distant countries, which will come into the Canadian National Exhibition in a big way this year with a government-sponsored exhibit. The Ceylon Tea Bureau, which is a governmental department, has engaged four thousand square feet of space in the Governments Building, and will have a display which will be altogether unique and quite unlike anything hitherto attempted in that interesting structure.

A huge shipment of emeralds, sapphires, rubber and rubber products, cocoa, cinnamon, rice, native handicrafts such as pottery, fabrics woven in grass, hand-hammered brass in addition to tea, has been shipped from the port of Colombo en route to Toronto. The exhibit will be accompanied by English-speaking natives in costume and aside from being designed to stimulate trade between Ceylon and Canada is highly educational.

Appropriately enough this year marks the 100th anniversary of a concerted campaign on the part of growers of Ceylon to introduce tea throughout the British Empire. Included in the shipment which occupies fifteen huge crates, are two dioramas with elaborate lighting and sound effects depicting the tea plantations with Cingalese natives and elephants at work and showing the picking curing and shipping processes.

Beware of Weed Seeds

Weed seeds find their way to the manure pile through the digestive systems of animals and in bedding. When fresh manure is hauled out and spread on the land viable weed seeds may be spread with it. If weeds are present allow the manure to remain in the pile for at least one month before spreading and thereby avoid the danger of increasing weed infestation. It will run much higher, but we feel reasonably certain that in all Ontario apple orchards sufficient larvae will have survived in sheltered spots to necessitate the application of the sprays outlined in the Ontario spray calendar.

Oil Imports Gain But Cost Is Less

Ottawa—Canada imported 1,066,463,853 gallons of petroleum in the fiscal year ending with March, valued at \$25,173,235, an increase in gallonage but a decrease in value compared with the previous year. Imports were up sharply in March, 73,981,459 gallons coming in compared with 54,657,687 gallons in March last year.

The attention of the citizens throughout Ontario is called to the importance of seeing that their names are incorporated on the Voters' Lists for the Provincial Election, to be held on June 19th. Chief Election Officer, I. A. Humphries, is taking special steps to see that everyone enjoying the franchise will be in a position to exercise it at the polls.

The Voters' Lists have been posted conspicuously in all the electoral districts and abundant opportunity is provided for individuals to examine these lists and learn if their name is included. In each district a Revising Officer will sit on specified dates to consider applications or complaints in regard to omission of names. It is incumbent upon each voter to satisfy himself or herself that their name is included. In cases where names are left off or corrections are needed such persons are advised to attend the Revising Officer's sitting, in person or to obtain Notice of Complaint forms and to file two days in advance of the aforementioned sittings.

It is especially urged upon the electorate that each voter should make the inclusion of his name on the list a matter of personal responsibility. Adequate machinery is provided and every care will be taken but individual co-operation is sought.

Mr. Humphries, Chief Election Officer issues a message to be public in the following terms:

"You enjoy the franchise. Exercise it. You should co-operate in order to see that your name is on the Voters' List.

"The responsibility is yours. Do not delay. Don't put it off until Election Day and then blame someone because your name is not on the Voters' List."
