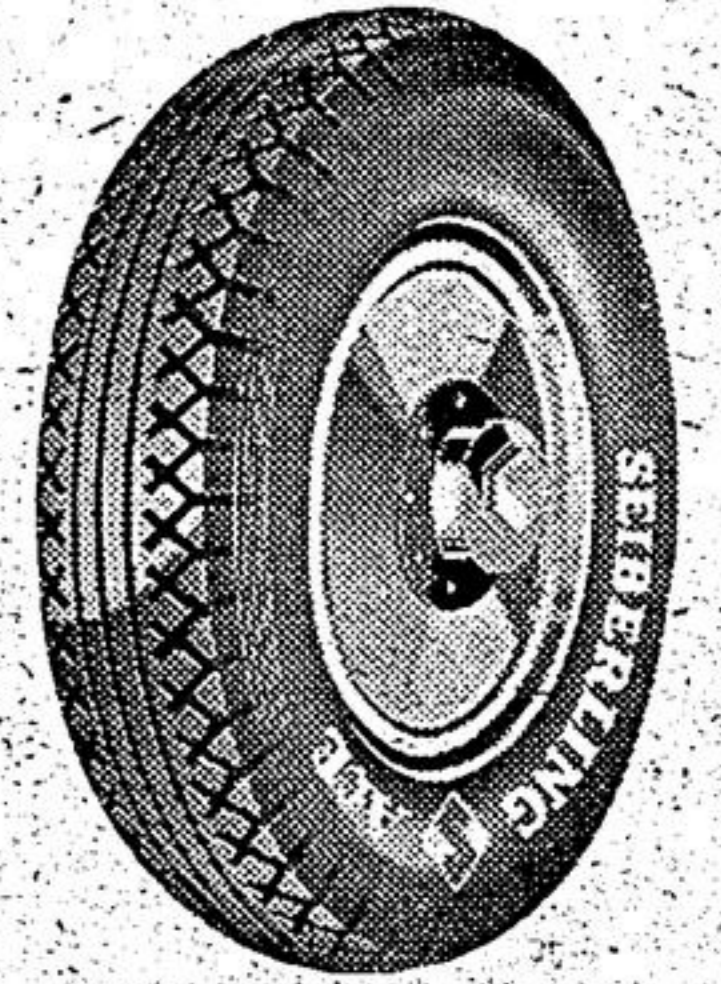
**In Memoriam**
