A lettergram received by her brother Mr. Frank Rae, on Tuesday, morning announced the safe arrival in Scotland of Mrs. Turner who sailed by C.P.R. steamer from Montreal on a holiday trip to the old land.

Realizing the evil effects of intoxicating liquor the Women's Christian Temperance Union in convention assembled at Richmond Hill, United Church, went on record as opposing the proposed beer and wine measure for Ontario.

The depredation caused among sheep in Markham and Whitechurch Townships ought to be enough to move any municipal council to impose a special tax on police dogs which would in due course wipe them out of the county. Some municipalities have seen fit to impose a tax of \$20 on police dogs, and it seems to be holding good in law for so far there has been no attempt on the part of dog owners to break it. The Dept. of Agriculture, is said to favor an increased tax on this breed.

Householders appear to have well observed the warning notice issued last week respecting the water by-law and the use of lawn hose. After all, it's for their own interest to do so, for such warnings are only issued from dire necessity, and co-operation means that everybody has water for domestic purposes, whereas a disregard for the bylaw would not only bring a fine but would more seriously deplete the water supply. The town of Aurora restricts use of lawn hose to one hour, and water for gardens by the hose route must be metered.

Our esteemed townsman Truman Holden has been seriously ill the past week with heart trouble. Last Thursday he was seized with severe pain, and on Friday grew worse until his condition was almost hopeless. Despite his great age of 82 years he rallied in a remarkable way over the weekend and has been holding his own for a few days. Mr. Holden took a great interest in the coming 12th of July celebration of the Orangemen in which organization he had been a member for over half a century, and if his health permits will be one of the oldest members in the parade here at the annual walk.

Mr. Lloyd Turner has met with a couple of misfortunes in his dairy herd the past week, which is a serious set back to any farmer in these times. One valuable Jersey cow had to be killed because she met with an injury of a mysterious nature while out to pasture, resulting in one hip going in, forming a hollow instead of protruding as it should, and in a few days this affected the other hip, so that the animal had to be disposed of. Right on top of this one of Mr. Turner's fine big Holsteins came in from pasture one morning with one test so severely cut that she had to be disposed of also. This latter accident may have happened, as it sometimes does, through being stepped on by another cow while lying down.

The Legislature just dissolved was elected in October, 1929. Since that time, the Government has presented five annual financial statements, known as the Public Accounts. The total amount spent by the Government on Ordinary Account, as shown by those five statements is \$277,812,884.50. During the ten year period since the present Government took office, there have been deficits totalling in all, \$13,597,353.51. This of course, was added to the Provincial debt.
