**MANY NEW SILOS CONSTRUCTED AS RESULT OF HAY DAMAGE**

**Corn Crops Replace Clover and Alfalfa**

Construction of silos in various parts of York County, in greater numbers than in any previous year within the memory of one builder, is a direct result of the severe weather which smote the alfalfa and clover last winter.

Planting of emergency crops, including much more than the usual amount of corn, has made it necessary for farmers to build silos to take care of the corn. An experienced farmer like Reeve Herman Kidd of Whitechurch township is building his first silo. His neighbor, William Simpson, has built himself a second silo.

O. Dike, of Mount Albert, builder of these two silos has just built six silos in the Agincourt district, for Glen Thompson, Jim Vincent, J. Darlington, Geo. Shedlock, Arthur Woods, and George Empringham.

"I have never before built so many silos in any one year," Mr. Dike stated.

Other farmers who have built silos recently include Martin O'Toole, Mt. Albert, Chester Vernon, Holt, and Harold Hayes, Mount Albert.

"We have never experienced so much winter-killing of hay, and in order to replace this feed crop farmers have sown such crops as peas and oats, millet, soya beans and a heavy additional acreage of corn," R. E. White, York County Agricultural representative, commented. As a result many new silos are being erected this year in which to store the corn crops.

"Many farmers who have not been using their silos for the past few years, and have been growing and feeding alfalfa in preference to corn or silage, will be glad to use their silos this year," Mr. White said. "Some farmers are building silos for the first time. Some farmers are building additional silos."

George Anthony, an Indian employed on the Glen Lonely Farm at Lake Wilcox, was gored by a bull on the farm. His injuries are not regarded as serious, but he was taken to the Newmarket Hospital for an X-ray examination. Bill Emmett and "Scotty" Wells saved Anthony from further injury by beating off the animal.

Anthony was leading the bull out of the stable when he tripped and fell. The animal ran past him and when the man recovered his feet and was attempting to snub the bull it rushed him against the wall, one of the horns entering the abdomen. Emmett and Wells, standing close by, rushed to Anthony's assistance.

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**BLOOMINGTON**

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**CURRENT CROP REPORT**

Dufferin County reports that with plenty of straw and fairly good crop of roots, especially turnips, available, maintenance rations for livestock are assured. Severe frosts have reduced the potato yield materially in the Dufferin district, while buck wheat, late corn and garden crops have also suffered damage. In Grey County too, frost has injured the same crops. Bean fields in Huron will not yield as well as indicated earlier in the season. In Oxford there are 107 farmers listed with smut-free wheat seed for sale.

Although farmers in Peel have only one-third the hay of last year, the present high prices will prevent many dairymen from purchasing. Straw and molasses, alfalfa straw and corn will provide the roughage this winter. Turnip aphids have injured the crop in Waterloo, while cattle are in thin condition due to poor pasture.

Frost for four nights in succession damaged crops in Wellington, with the heaviest loss in late corn. Yields of oats running up to 100 bus. per acre on four acres have been reported there. Turnip aphids have also been active in that district. Essex County reports a great scarcity of feed, with winter feeding the rule for two months on scores of farms. Yields in Haldimand are much better than anticipated. Potato growers in Lambton are trying to establish a price of 50c a bag for potatoes. Frost in Middlesex injured tender plants such as cucumbers, squash and melons, while hundreds of acres of late sown buckwheat were ruined, and corn and potatoes were also affected. Due to hail and frost, Norfolk's tobacco crop has been reduced from 20 to 14 million pounds.

Crops yields have exceeded anticipations in Wentworth. Peaches are commanding a price ranging from 50c to 75c for 6-quart baskets.

Corn, roots and buckwheat have shown much improvement in Northumberland and the prospect of fodder is much improved. Peterborough reports the heaviest grain yield in five years, as also does part of York County.

**MUST RETURN TAX ROLL SEPTEMBER 30**
