Farmers' Information

On Tuesday evening, Jan. 22, the annual oyster supper of the Temperanceville beef ring, took place at the home of W.E. Barker, Temperanceville. Over 60 patrons, their wives and families were present. Walter Wood, gave a short speech on the business of the ring, the excellent quality of the cattle killed, and the good work of the butcher, Wm. Storey, who cut and distributed the meat to the satisfaction of all. Speeches were also made by the secretary, Arthur Borair, and Leonard Harman. The last named speaker who is a keen student of economics, emphasized the cooperative spirit that prevails in our beef ring, pointing out that it was only through cooperative methods, such as obtains in our beef ring, that the farmers of this Dominion can expect to reap the benefit of their labors by securing goods at cost. He went on to illustrate the sale of cattle at the Union Stock-yards at Toronto, where, he said, Canada Packers buy two-thirds of the cattle marketed, and who during the past 3 years have made the largest profits in their history, and this profit during the worst depression in history, especially for the farming industry.

Wake up brother farmers and control your own industry, Mr. Harman said. Stevens has started the ball rolling. Let us see to it, that it keeps on rolling until it lands in the right place, namely, where the farmer will get cost of production plus a living wage for his labor.

Feed Sunshine

Cod liver oil, the sunshine substitute, is one of the most important items in the properly balanced poultry ration. Where birds are closely confined during the winter months, as is the case in most parts of Canada, they receive very little direct sunlight, and with the rations usually fed they do not receive all the vitamins they require. Calcium and phosphorus are two minerals specially required for laying pullets and hens in the manufacture of eggs. The digestion and assimilation of materials, especially calcium require one of two things; an abundance of direct sunshine or an abundance of vitamin D. Cod liver oil is rich in vitamin D, and is one of the reliable sources of this type of food.

Repairing Tillage Implements

Careful repairing of tillage machinery each winter or early spring with replacement of doubtful or worn parts has been proven in experiments on cost of operating farm machinery to pay large dividends by preventing major costly repairs.

Tillage implements generally receive less care and more hard knocks than any other class of farm machinery.

The value of any implement can only be measured by its usefulness in acres covered, quality of work done and freedom from the necessity of costly repairs and delays due to breakdowns during the rush tillage season, and easily prevented if the farmer, with a few tools and a little time, will check over carefully every working or wearing part long before he is going to use the machine.

Your Seed Supply

It is not too early in the season for a farmer to be thinking about his seed supply for the coming spring. In far too many cases no thought is given to the matter until a few days before the seed is required and by that time it may be difficult to obtain, and he will be compelled to take seed of inferior quality. It is a good policy to be sure of your seed supply early in the season. The farmer who is growing a standard variety or grain that is yielding well and is adapted to his farm would be well advised to use it for his own seedling requirements. It has been proven that if such grains are well cleaned, free from weed seeds, mixtures and other impurities and the very best sown it would improve rather than deteriorate.

On a lot of farms there are bins of the very best grains that are being fed off their livestock or being sold for feeding purposes. Would it not be good business to set up the fanning mill at this time of the year, when farm work is not so pressing and clean this grain or haul it to your nearest cleaning centre? Smaller grains may be chopped or taken home and fed whole. They make good feed.

Fattening Poultry

In crate-feeding poultry particular care should be taken to feed a ration which will produce the white fat and the milk-fed quality. The following ration has been tested and found suitable for crate feeding: Equal parts of middlings, ground oats and barley; equal parts of middlings, ground oats and ground new potatoes; equal parts of middlings, ground oats and mashed potatoes; equal parts of middlings, ground oats and cornmeal; equal parts of shorts, ground oats and ground barley; equal parts of low grade flour, ground barley and ground oats; equal parts of ground whole wheat, ground whole oats and ground whole barley; equal parts of ground barley, ground buckwheat and bran.
