**CHARGE HOG DEALS FRAUDULENT**

(Continued from front page) nesses, Magistrate Ebbs said that he wanted to look over the evidence and would give his decision in a week.

Mr. Locke said that this would put his client to additional expense, when he did not have a dollar. He submitted that with the exception of Mr. Chapman's evidence, there was nothing to show that his client was guilty in any way of the offence charged and Mr. Chapman's evidence had not been substantiated by Dr. Edwards and other witnesses.

**A Second Charge**

A second charge of the same nature and under the same section of the criminal code was read to Mr. Beatty, the complainant being Mr. L. E. Dunn, of Pickering Township. Mr. Dunn charged that Mr. Beatty obtained from him 9 head of pigs on July 19, 1934, by fraud and false pretence. To this charge Mr. Beatty pleaded not guilty and elected trial by the magistrate.

Under the deal, said Mr. Dunn, he was to get from Mr. Beatty 2 sows, one with a litter of seven, one close up and another small one for his little boy. They were to be registered Yorkshire animals. He accepted the pigs on July 24, and signed a book that he had received them in good condition. Witness explained that he hesitated at that time to sign. Later he found that they were not as represented, one of them having recently belonged to a neighbor.

Several witnesses were heard in this case, including Mr. Beatty, who claimed that he had lived up to his contract with Mr. Dunn and had given him exactly what he promised him and more.

The case was reserved for decision
