Few men have retained the hardiness of manhood such as has Abram H. Raymer of Baker Avenue. Last Saturday he reached his 84th birthday, and all week or most of it, he was busy hauling logs with the team. He tops the tallest loads of hay that the wagon can safely draw in the fall season, and in fact there seems to be no work too strenuous for him. Mr. Raymer is to be congratulated on his physical condition at his advanced age. All his senses are really good, even his hearing being keen.

The sad news has reached town concerning the death of Mrs. Bruehl, wife of Mr. Charlie Bruehl of Vernon, B.C. and a former Ringwood boy, and brother of Mrs. Frank Baker, of Stouffville. Mrs. Bruehl passed away on February 21, leaving her husband, two daughters and one son to mourn for a beloved wife and mother. She was a Port Perry girl, her maiden name being Myrtle Gibson. Friends of the family will regret to learn of the break in this family circle. Interment was made at Vernon on February 25th.

It's all right to talk about the "silly old goose," but the one owned by Master Elgin Hastings at Lemonville knows how to take care of herself in a bad situation. The other Sunday the goose, was missing, and a thorough search over the farm failed to reveal its whereabouts. Three nights and two days later the hired man cut holes in the ice on the small stream, when the old goose came out none the worse for her confinement. The creek had frozen over and she became a prisoner living in the small space between the water and the ice which has a habit of freezing so as to leave an air space over spring water.

One of our local girls suffered the loss of goods and cash to the value of \$150 by thieves in Toronto last week. The victim is Miss Jessie Walls, R.N., supervisor on the surgery floor at the Toronto East General Hospital. Miss Walls occupies quarters in the nurses' residence at the rear of the hospital, and by means of gaining entrance through a window a thief or thieves entered the building the other evening just before the nurses came off duty, and made away with a good haul. Several of the girls in residence were victimized, Miss Walls losing a ring valued as a keep sake, and several other articles of jewelry, as well as more than \$70 in cash. So far no one has been apprehended in connection with the matter, but it is suggested that the robbery was committed by someone who had access to the general movements of the nurses in residence.

The death took place at Brooklin, on Monday, February 25th, 1935, of Walter McLean, beloved husband of Annie McLean, in his 76th year, and father of our Mrs. Thomas Jennings. Deceased who had been in ill health for some months, had been a resident of Brooklin for many years where he carried the mail and express for a long period of time. Previous to moving to Brooklin he had been a successful farmer in East Whitby (Columbus.) During his residence there he had served on the East Whitby Council for several years. The late Mr. McLean was well known and highly thought of in the community where he had lived for so long a time. He leaves besides his widow two daughters, Mrs. Jessie Derry, Toronto, Mrs. Thomas Jennings, Stouffville, and two sons, Leslie, at home and Frank, of Whitby. The funeral took place from his late residence, on Thursday, February 28th. Interment was made in Groveside Cemetery, Brooklin.

Grants for Agriculture Only

Directors of rural fairs will welcome the announcement made recently by the Honourable Duncan Marshall, Ontario's minister of agriculture, that grants are to be continued and fairs encouraged. The withdrawal of these grants was one of the economies announced by the Hepburn government shortly after it came into power, and many protests followed. No doubt these reached the government and produced the conviction that it would be a very unwise step.

The Minister of Agriculture, however, is anxious that the grants be used solely for agricultural purposes and has warned against the giving of harness horse races at the expense of the agricultural prize list. This practice, which is widespread in the rural sections, will not be tolerated, the minister warns.

"In some of the local fairs the 'speeding events,' are the principal attractions and are strongly supported as a means of increasing attendance," says the Canadian Statesman, Bowmanville, which adds: "They may have their place, but the encouragement of that which makes for improved conditions was the purpose for which fairs were established and for which they are continued and supported. In too many places the prize list remains unchanged from year to year, with the result that the professional exhibitors gather in the rewards to such an extent that competition in some of the classes practically disappears. This is particularly so in the ladies' department and fine arts of local fairs where some girls, now become grandmothers, or at least old enough, have been exhibiting the same tea towels, night gowns, scarfs, water colors, etc., for well nigh to half a century. For this reason the canvassers for the annual contribution are not received as cheerfully nor treated as generously as in other days. The result is the cancellation of the 'show fair' in various places in recent years. It has frequently been suggested that greater good would be accomplished by additional support to the school fairs even at the expense of the old time county or township fair would be fully justified. This is a matter that might well engage the attention of the minister."
