Poultry Plucking

A new, cleaner, and faster method of plucking poultry is coming into use, and has become popular in the United States. It is the use of wax mixtures. After the rough feathers are removed either by scalding as some do it now, or by dry plucking, the bird is reduced to a coolness by allowing to stand, then it is dipped into the mixture, which is allowed to cool. The wax may then be removed from the bird, taking with it the small feathers, pin feathers, hair and scales. Care, of course, must be taken in regard to hardening the wax on the bird. If it becomes too hard, it will be brittle and takes more time to remove. A properly hardened coat will come off in elastic layers. The cost of wax, says the research Council is 8.2 cents per pound, and very little wax is lost in the process, because it is readily melted down and the feathers removed from it.
