"And it came to pass that throughout the entire land there was depression accompanied by abnormally high and wholly un-Christian money rates and a complete paralysis of commerce and industry of such severity as the world had not experienced before or is likely to witness in the future. Even the foremost among the citizenry were guilty of engaging in financial deals of a dubious nature. Reckless borrowing was practised everywhere, regardless of the high rates of interest and the high premiums which borrowers were obliged to pay. In this way the charges became so heavy that it was impossible to meet them. Each one was in debt. All became poor, and their poverty led them to deceive and defraud those who had come to their aid. Many were ruined, and large numbers died from grief.

"I am writing this that it may serve you as an example, that you may learn therefrom to fear and obey God, and not shun work or seek to expand against the will of the Lord. For those who would grow rich by force and speed, invariably grow poor and bankrupt."

**FARMERS ARE GOING TO FIGHT WARBLE & HEEL FLIES**

One hundred and sixty key-men, representing every School Section in Ontario County are lining up their neighbors in a County wide fight against the Warble and Heel Fly nuisance which has been causing many thousands of dollars loss annually to cattle men.

During the past few days every farmer in the County has received from the Ontario Department of Agriculture, full instructions as to how to proceed against this pest. Arrangements have been made with over 50 stores throughout the County to distribute Warble Fly Powder at a special price.

During the past week meetings have been held in every township at which leading live stock men from every district showed keen interest in this concerted effort to eradicate this pest from Ontario County. The treatment for Warbles is quite simple and effective as well as inexpensive, the cost figuring out about 3c per head. The first treatment should be applied without delay at this time, this to be followed by two more treatments each 4 weeks apart. The Warble Fly Powder is mixed with approximately 5 times its bulk of soft water and the mixture is then rubbed into the Warble lumps on the backs of the cattle.

Ontario County farmers are urgently requested to co-operate with the key-men for their School Sections by purchasing Warble Fly Powder and applying it according to Directions.

The Powder is put up in pound and in half pound packages. One pound is sufficient for three treatments for 20 to 30 head of cattle depending on how numerous the Warble fly lumps are on the backs of the cattle and depending also on the care used in applying it. Powder should be mixed fresh for each treatment.

**A NEW HEN**

Canada has contributed materially to the making of what is claimed as a new hen which has been evolved by agricultural scientists at Cambridge University, England. The bird at the moment is the object of considerable attention in the Old Country, and concerning it the "Spectator" says—"Few successes of greater interest and practical possibilities have been won in the field of Agricultural biology than the making of the new Cambridge hen. Her chicks declare their sex at birth, because the males and females are differently marked. This is a great advantage to the poultry industry, since chicks travel safely and well only during the first two days of their life. The new breed, known as Cambar, was developed by Dr. R. C. Punnet and his associates at Cambridge, England, by the application of Mendelian principles. By the use of the Canadian Banded Plymouth Rock (supplied by the University of British Columbia to Cambridge University) both silver and golden Cambars have been evolved. They are prolific layers of large coloured eggs, whilst still possessing the virtue of sex-linked chicks. These chicks mark an epoch in "the scientific breeding of poultry."

**WAS TEACHER 60 YEARS AGO**

Taught at Ballantrae and Claremont.

Edwin Ball, 86 last September, died early Monday morning after a short illness at his home, in Newmarket where he had lived for the past five years.

A retired teacher, he was a native of Grey county, born near Meaford. His father, born in Ireland, homesteaded in the county. Mr. Ball's first school was in Grey. He taught in school section nine, East Gwillimbury township, in 1873. Subsequently Mr. Ball taught at Ballantrae, Willowdale for years, Claremont and Islington. He was married in 1878 to Jennie Rose, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Rose, who farmed four miles north of Queensville. This farm, homesteaded about 1809, is still in the Rose family. Mr. and Mrs. Rose celebrated their 56th wedding anniversary last Dec. 24.

**NOTES & COMMENTS**

Announcement has been made that the Ontario Government will permit the use of dogs in deer hunting next season. This is the only major change to be made in the game laws this year, and will mean the dire destruction of the deer unless they step more lively than they had to do last year when they had only man and his gun to fear.

The Bank of Canada intends to issue a \$25 bill to commemorate King George's accession to the throne. The bank means all right, but its such an exclusive sort of gesture.

The late H.H. Miller, of Hanover, the able and energetic M.P. for South Grey when Sir Wilfrid Laurier was Premier of Canada, was the father of the Lord's Day Act which prohibited the carrying on of public work on the Sabbath Day. Last Thursday a Day-of-Rest Bill was given its first and second reading in 22 minutes. It is a Bill along the same lines as the Lord's Day Act and provides for one day's rest in seven for all working people excepting under very exceptional circumstances at certain seasons. The first enactment for a weekly day of rest was embodied in the Ten Commandments by Moses in the beginning of the world's history when the Lord who had completed the formation of land and water in six days rested on the seventh day and blessed and hallowed it as an example for all time. When people will not voluntarily obey God's commands it is always necessary to pass legislation to compel them to desist from open violation, at least, of God's laws, for the moral well-being on the state.

The last meeting of Chesley council was featured by a debate as to whether or not town councillors should sell goods or materials to the town. The thing is quite illegal, of course, but is generally carried on and no great harm results. There is no real reason why a man should be cut off because he is willing to devote his services to the town. The only trouble arises if members of the council get their heads together to put something across from which they would severally or individually benefit, and develop a racket in town contracts. When it comes to such a pass, it is time the law steps in. —Hanover Post.
