

ACROSS CANADA

Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island.—Although its production of creamery butter in 1934 amounted to only 658 boxes, Prince Edward Island held the unique distinction of turning out 100 per cent "firsts." Cheese also graded high, with an output of 3,096 boxes of which 98.5 per cent were firsts.

Halifax, Nova Scotia.—The creameries of Nova Scotia are capable of turning out twice the present amount of butter, if supplies of cream were forthcoming, Mr. W. J. Bird, Dairy Superintendent of Nova Scotia, reports. There are great opportunities for development in the province, he adds.

Kentville, Nova Scotia.—It is anticipated that a party from overseas composed of buyers and importers of Nova Scotia and Canadian fruit generally, will make a trip to Canada in the fall leaving England about September 14th next. It is the intention of the party to visit Toronto first, then come to St. John, N.B., cross the Bay of Fundy to Digby, then on to Kentville where the members will spend a few days at the Cornwallis Inn.

Saint John, New Brunswick.—The New Brunswick Record of Performance Society forwarded a shipment of 24 Barred Rock pullets and cockerels to the Department of Agriculture, Trinidad recently. The assortment was collected through the co-operation of the Dominion Livestock tested by the Provincial Department of Agriculture. The birds will be used as foundation stock in the West Indies.

Fredericton, New Brunswick.—Shipments of potatoes to Cuba this season are almost double in volume those of the previous season, the estimate of Mr. C. H. Godwin, of the Dominion Seed Potato Inspection Service, being 209,000 bushels this season as compared with 119,000 bushels last season.

Quebec, Quebec.—A campaign to bring the membership up to 2,000 was decided upon at the recent meeting of the Council of the Quebec Chamber of Commerce.

Montreal, Quebec.—The travelling "lecture caravan" of the Canadian Forestry Association gave instruction to 122,500 people in rural settlements throughout Canada during the past year, according to the annual report. In addition to the media of moving pictures other methods of public instruction included the co-operation of thousands of rural schools and the organization of six thousand junior forest wardens by which the national cause of forest protection and the conserving of the game and fish was greatly advanced.

Ottawa.—In the mining industry, \$17,460,000 was added to the value of Canada's gold production in 1934, due to the average price for this precious metal increasing, from \$28.60 a fine ounce in 1933 to \$34.49 in 1934.

Toronto, Ontario.—Ontario mines produced \$70,663,046 in gold in 1934, compared with \$47,872,532, in 1933, an increase of 46 per cent. The increase was partly due to the higher average price for gold received in 1934. The number of tons milled last year by gold mines was 6,375,867, compared with 5,607,395 tons in 1933. The figures supplied by the Ontario Department of Mines are all in Canadian funds. December output was \$6,086,308 compared with \$3,741,464, in the same month of 1933.

Port Arthur, Ontario.—A total of 6,800 claims were staked in the Port Arthur mining division during 1934, which is a record for the local office. This represents a total of approximately \$102,000 in registration fees for the local office.

Winnipeg, Manitoba.—For the first time in its history the Canadian Fruit and Vegetable Jobbers' Association will hold their convention in Winnipeg. This is the 10th annual convention of this body and delegates from all over Canada have signified their intention of attending.

Brandon, Manitoba.—The Manitoba Provincial Exhibition will be held in Brandon this year, from the first of July to the fifth, it was decided at the recent meeting of "Class A" fairs in Winnipeg.

Regina, Saskatchewan.—A distinct increase in horse-breeding activities last year over 1933 is reported by the Dominion Department of Agriculture. Horse breeders' clubs in the Prairie Provinces numbered 166, an increase of 32 per cent over 1933. The census of horses during the mid-year showed 2,933,400. Shipments of Clydesdales and Percheron geldings were made to the United Kingdom during the year. Also a caravan of pure bred hunter type sires went to the Barbados for constabulary work. A demand is reported developing in Australia for Clydesdales and Percherons from Canada for breeding purposes, and negotiations are under way with China for shipping 500 head of unbroken western range horses.

Saskatoon, Sask.—Regal, the new smooth-awned barley put out by the University of Saskatchewan is becoming popular as a general-purpose barley, according to Dr. J. B. Harrington, Field Husbandry Department, University of Saskatchewan.

TELEVISION

Cannot Be Made Popular In U.S. Without Sacrifice Of Many Sound Programs.

Pasadena, Cal.—Crowding of the wave bands by the present sound broadcasters, and not technical difficulties, was blamed by Prof. S. S. Mackeown of the California Institute of Technology for the fact that this country is lagging behind England in television.

Professor Mackeown, electrical authority, said radio listeners could have television today, provided they sacrificed their sound programs at the rate of 100 for each television broadcast.
