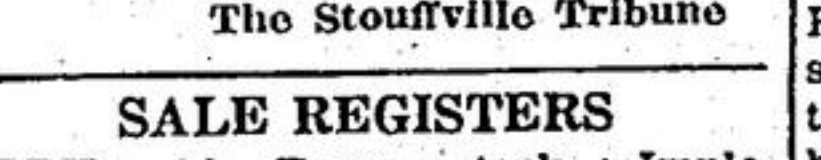
NOTICE TO SUBSCRIBERS
