March Customs Returns Lower

Ottawa-Department of National Revenue have issued figures showing customs and excise collections for last March of \$17,519,040, a decrease of \$460,902, compared with March, 1934, collections. For the 12 months ended March 31; collections were placed at \$226,705,605, an increase of \$23,431,451 compared with collections for the previous 12 months.

Customs collections last month totalled \$6,632,316, a decrease of \$128,454. Excise taxes at \$7,678,478 were down \$621,519 while excise duties totalling \$3,129,993 showed an increase of \$315,922. Miscellaneous collections netted \$78,251, down \$26,-

For the 12 months period custom duties were \$74,785,992, increased \$10,311,721. For the same 12 months excise collections were \$5,624,761 greater at \$107,584,613.

Excise duties worth \$43,628,937 were up \$7,628,776. Miscellaneous collections at \$706,062, showed Brop of \$133,215.





So far, we have considered tone as made only by gradation of black and white. The question may arise- as color is to be used in Design, how are colors to be regarded in relations of "tone?" It is hardly necessary at this stage, to point out the color equivalents of the Value Scale. At present it will help us sufficiently in arranging colors, to produce Tone Rhythm, to consider light colors as light tone, and dark color as dark

And to sum up our study of Tone Rhytom, we have seen: That may arrange lights and darks well as lines and shapes. That the eye is attracted to the point of the greatest contrast in such an arrangement. That we may therefore set up a movement in our design, through the use of contrast and harmony, which will lead the eye where we wish it to go. 


