EXPLOSION BULGES WALLS

Washing Curtains With Gasoline
Proves Disastrous

An explosion which was heard
for blocks, caused by gasoline
fumes in the home of R. E.
White, Court Street, Newmarket,
and widely known in Stouffville and
York County as the Agricultural
representative, Tuesday afternoon
did considerable damage to the
brick house rented by Mr. White.
Mrs. White had been washing a
pair of curtains in gasoline in the
basement and had hung them
up to dry. Noticing the fumes she
had opened the cellar door and had
just nicely gone upstairs when a
terrific explosion shook the house.
Rushing downstairs to ascertain the
cause she was caught in the
flames receiving slight burns to
the face. Mr. Sanford King, who
resides nearby, was one of the first
to arrive at the home and he ran
upstairs and carried Mrs. Johnston,
invalid mother of Mrs. White, to
safety. Quick action by the local fire
brigade, under Fire Chief Osborne
soon had the fire under control. The
force of the concussion was so
great that windows in homes on
both sides were cracked and the
solid brick walls were bulged. The
furnace pipes in the cellar were
flattened as if they had been
pounded together.
