

writer says:---"This place of worship is located on lot 32, concession 5, Markham. The, area of the Markham settlement was formerly served by two regular appointments, Mr. Huber and Stecklin. The former was probably at Gormley and the latter near the Steckley residences. These two names appear as regular appointments in 1858 Calendar, but do not appear after the Almira Church was built. The brick building at Almira was built in 1860, and the property was .- deeded to the Mennonite Church by Jacob Wideman. John Christian and Jacob Wideman were the first trustees. At the present time meetings are held on every alternate Sunday.

The ministers who resided near the church and served are, Adam Wideman, Jacob Wideman, Samuel Wideman, Lewis S. Weber, and Aaron D. Grove. .L. S. Weber was ordained at the Waterloo church for this place, and labored here for a time. On Sept. 2, 1931, A. D. Grove. a member of this congregation, was ordained to the ministry at the Wideman church, Bishop Hallman

and Derstine presiding. Daniel Hoover, sr., Christian L. Hoover, Manasseh R. Fretz and Jacob H. Wideman are the deacons who have served this place and Wideman's jointly.


