LIBERALS TO HOLD CONVENTION ON MONDAY AUG. 19

The convention of the North York Liberal Association to name a candidate to contest the riding at the coming federal election will be held in Richmond Hill arena Monday evening, August 19, Col. W. P. Mulock, K.C., M.P., who was elected with a sweeping majority in the by-election last fall and who has represented the riding with marked ability during the last session of parliament will undoubtedly again be tendered a unanimous nomination. The convention promises to be one of the largest ever held in the riding of North York and the speakers will include Hon. Mitchell F. Hepburn, Premier of Ontario; W. A. Fraser, M.P. from Trenton; Ross Gray M.P. from Sarnia, as well as the North York members Col. Mulock and Morgan Baker. All electors of the riding are cordially invited to attend the meeting which will commence at 8.30 p.m. Daylight Saving Time.

THRASHING LICENSE NEWEST ISSUE

The great number of weeds cut down in the Province of Ontario this year had caused the Provincial Government to issue licenses in order to control the spread of weed seeds throughout the country. It has become necessary to enforce every thrasher operating a thrashing business to have a registration certificate for his machine before commencing operations, and to cleanse his machine and equipment before moving same. This applies to all machines moved from farm to farm only. A certificate is necessary for each machine similar to an automobile license. Weed inspectors within each township are to enforce the law with the assistance of the government weed inspectors.

GOLDIE FLEMING TALKS ALL ABOUT RECONSTRUCTION

Also Outlines Liberal Policies on Responsible Government and Personal Liberty—Condemns the Conservative Government's Action in Slashing Veterans Pensions.

The federal election campaign is underway in East York in dead earnest, so far as the Liberal candidate is concerned, and Goldie Fleming is blazing his way through the riding, in a manner that is focusing attention in the very remote parts of the district. Meetings in the interests of Mr. Fleming have recently been held at Thornhill, Newtonbrook, Willowdale, all in North York, and Todmorden and other centres in East York, also at Scarboro Bluffs, Oakridge, West Hill and Scarboro Jct. Meetings will shortly be held in the north when the farmers complete harvesting operations now in full swing.

The candidate for the York East Riding, Goldie Fleming, addressed Woodbine; Donlands Liberals the other evening, and at the conclusion of an able speech he was tendered a hearty ovation by those present, clearly demonstrating that the association was solidly behind his candidature.

Mr. Fleming in his address outlined the policies of the Federal Liberal Party, he stated that the Tariff Policy of the Conservatives had been steadily drying up the Canadian trade streams, and it must be obvious to all thinking people that if Mr. Bennett's high tariff policy was persisted in due time it would economically ruin the Country.

The Candidate further said that under the tariff policies of the Liberal Party, the trade of Canada had greatly increased during the Regimes of the late Sir Wilfred Laurier and the Right Hon. Wm. Lyon McKenzie King, and he predicted that the Liberal Party would if returned to power bring about improved trade conditions through reverting to the former Liberal Party's Tariff Policy, as Canada could not live unto itself alone, but must trade with the other Nations of the world.

Mr. Fleming reminded his audience that the leader of the Conservative party Hon. R. B. Bennett in 1930, had stated he would "Blaspheme his way into the Markets of the World," but instead of accomplishing this, his tariff policy has driven thousands of Canadians to the bread lines and poor houses.

Regarding unemployment the candidate went on to state that the Liberal Party would, if returned, make it their first concern, and by adoption of Policy of co-operation between the provinces and municipalities for the administration of unemployment relief, and in endeavouring to provide work for the unemployed. He was strongly of the opinion that the vast majority of our unemployed citizens desired work at standard wages rather than a Dole System of relief.

Mr. Fleming in speaking on the question of Responsible Government said the present Conservative Government had usurped the rights of Parliament and had assumed autocratic powers by investing in the Cabinet, unlimited control. He said Liberalism stands as always for a FREE PARLIAMENT, and for the Supremacy of parliament and it would repeal the legislation enacted by the administration which deprives parliament of its control of ex-

penditures and taxation, and invests the Executive with unwarranted arbitrary powers, as for example: (1) Legislation permitting the Executive to enact measures by Order-in-Council for Peace, Order and Good Government.

(2) Legislation providing the Executive with a "Blank Cheque" for expenditures of any kind.

The Candidate in speaking on the attitude of the Liberal Party towards personal liberty, said the Conservatives under cover of the present crisis had abrogated the rights of FREE SPEECH and FREE ASSOCIATION, he stated that with this purpose in view of restoring these fundamental British principles that the Liberals stood pledged to repeal that vicious legislation known as "Section 98 of the Criminal Code," and put an end to the present practice of arbitrary deportation.

PROPER BARLEY WILL FIND A GOOD MARKET

A deputation from York County Council were advised by Premier Hepburn last week that farmers could be raising the right type of barley, find a market for their product in the breweries of the province.

The deputation, headed by M. Baker, member for North York, and W. J. Garthouse, M.P.P. for West York, came to ask the premier to urge the brewers to use more Ontario barley in the manufacture of their product. They were told that the brewers are already using all the Ontario grain that is fit for that purpose.

FARMERS MAY LOWER PORK

Hogs are selling around the satisfactory price of \$9.50 for the Ontario farmer off trucks, Toronto, but over in the U.S.A. the price has climbed to \$12 and pork is so high at the butcher shops that house wives are picketing the meat markets to prevent its sale. Thus do things go from one extreme to another.

Hogs are one of the easy things to produce fast, and we are informed that a local farmer has 13 hogs mostly bred on a 100 acre farm, so we see the market glutted in the not distant future, which is a surer way to destroy the price of pork than any picketing organization can accomplish.

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The Part the C. N. R. Plays in Marketing Canada's Crops.

So essential to the trade, commerce, and general welfare of Canada are the various classes of freight carried in the course of a year by Canadian National Railways that it is difficult to give pride of place to any particular one, but in their all-round importance to every section of the community, agricultural products must rank very high. They form the backbone of the nation's business activities and contribute directly and in large volume to its industry and employment everywhere.

During 1934 the C. N. R. carried over eight and a half million tons of agricultural produce, being an increase of 6.44% over 1933. In this total are included 134,700,000 bushels of wheat, 14,000,000 bushels of corn, 35,700,000 bushels of oats, and 15,500,000 bushels of barley; the aggregate of these commodities showing an increase of 4.1% when compared with the preceding year.

It is interesting to note that the average haul of each ton of wheat was approximately seven hundred and fifty miles.

Without the rail facilities of the C.N.R. no doubt some of this agricultural produce might still have reached a market, but it could only have done so at a much higher cost to the producer, and the quantity would necessarily have been negligible. For practically all the crops which enter into the figures above enumerated were placed in freight cars at points where the only rail transportation obtainable was that provided by Canadian National Railways.

These crops come from far scattered districts. In many cases from sparsely populated communities. . . but they are the result of the labours of men and women who each year create millions and millions of dollars of new wealth for Canada. In this work the C.N.R. is their partner and helper.

As is well known the crop movements of recent years have been much below normal . . . much below the standard of productivity of our prairies and agricultural areas, and much below the volume which the C. N. R. is equipped to handle. The figures quoted should, therefore, be considered in that light.
