## Bonus For Dairy Farmers

A fund of \$1,000,000.00 has been set up from which cheese milk producers will-receive a bonus of 1%c for every pound of cheese made from milk shipped to the cheese maker. By diverting milk from butter to cheese, this will help both classes of dairying, as lessened butter production will bring higher prices.

#### Widening Empire Markets:

Through the Ottawa Agreements of 1932, the Conservative Government secured preferenc, by quota and otherwise, in the markets of the Empire for Canadian farm and other primary products. As a result, the total value of Canadian exports to Empire countries has increased by \$118,000,000.00 in the past two years.

#### Protecting Canadian Markets:

When the United States, in the Spring of 1930, enacted tariffs that effectively barred Canadian farm products out of that Country, the Conservative Government, as soon as it got into office, provided tariffs on farm goods that preserved the Canadian market for the Canadian farmer.

#### Wheat Board Established:

Under legislation passed at the last session of Parliament, the Wheat Board-was established, by means of which the Canadian Wheat crop can be marketed systematically and at the best possible prices obtainable. The Board is designed to protect wheat prices from unscrupulous speculators.

#### Lightening Debt **Burdens:**

The enactment of the Farmers' Creditors Arrangement by which the farmer, struggling under a load of piled-up debt, may secure adjustment and stay on his farm, has brought relief and hope to thousands of Canadian farmers. In Ontario alone, 1,756 settlements were reported by the Official Receivers to the end of July.

### Co-operative Marketing:

By the Natural Products Marketing Act, power was given to the farmers to propose schemes for the marketing of their products; and where such schemes are organized, administrative and financial assistance is offered, so that the producer may have a stable market and better prices.

#### Loans to Ontario Farmers:

The Canadian Farm Loan Act provides another measure of relief to farmers. The Act was amended to permit the Board to make loans in all provinces, and, under its provisions, a fund up to \$90,000,000 .-00 has been made available to make loans to farmers at five per cent on first and six per cent on second mortgages.
