Ford Spending Several Million

Observes the Windsor Star — Ford of Canada is not only important as a local manufacturing concern, it is a vital factor in giving employment to parts manufacturers in other sections of Canada. Millions of dollars are spent for the products of these parts and materials. Factories and other millions are spent for saw materials and for the freight and other haulage charges to get them to Windsor. The fact that the Ford Company is going strong here means that many other smaller industries are kept running and giving employment to their workers. Without the Ford contracts, these smaller concerns would fold up with consequent unemployment in various parts of Dominion.

During this year Ford of Canada will spend more than \$1,000,000 for various services and materials in each of Sarnia, Hamilton, Toronto and Windsor. The amount in Windsor goes to the different factories supplying the Canadian Ford.

The company will spend from \$100,000 to \$500,000 in each of Chatham, Ingersoll, New Toronto, Niagara Falls, Sault Ste. Marie, Tilbury, Woodstock, Montreal, Farnham, Que., and Sinclair Mills, B.C. From \$50,000 to \$100,000 will be spent in each of Guelph, Kitchener, Waterloo, Oshawa, Welland and Peterborough.

Smaller disbursements will be made in each of 63 towns and cities extending from Nova Scotia to British Columbia.

Australia Census Lists 6,724,305

CANBERRA, Australia.—Official figures show that on June 3 of this year Australia's population was 6,724,305. Males predominated, numbering 3,409,336, compared with 3,314,969 females.
The gain in population for the year was 47,908, or 1,350 more than the gain in the previous year. A fall of 248 in the natural increase was more than balanced by an improvement of 1,598 in the migration figures. The natural increase during the first six months of 1935 was 25,451, compared with 24,939 in the corresponding period of the previous year. This, in the opinion of the Commonwealth statistician, is indicative of at least a temporary slackening of the fall of the natural increase rate.

Through the co-operation of returned men, the east wing of Canadian Legion Hall, Fort Francis, Ont., has been turned over to the local Scouts for a Christmas Toy Shop.

Three plots were the real treasure hidden in Point Pleasant Park for a treasure hunt by the 17th Halifax Troop. Appropriately the plots were secured by the Bear Patrol.

One hundred and sixty-five Scouts, Cubs and Rovers from St. Lawrence and Lennoxville, Que., gathered for the presentation of His Worship Mayor Bradley of the Gilt Cross for life saving to Scout Fred V. Sinclair of the 4th Sherbrooke Troop. The meeting was opened with flag break, Scout Silence and the Club's Grand Hurl.

A Certificate of Merit was awarded Scout Roy Phillips for his share in the rescue, which involved diving to bring up a fellow Scout, at last summer's camp, and the successful use of artificial respiration.

Peterborough, Ont., Rover Crew is developing correspondence with a Rover Crew in Peterborough, England.

Two Perth, Ont., Boy Scouts on duty in connection with a local Boy Scout Apple Day were able to furnish the police with information which led to the arrest of the driver of a hit-and-run car involved in an accident in which a man was injured.

The Master Diver for the C.N.R. Atlantic Region, Mr. A. P. Ceretti, is Scoutmaster of the new Scout Troop of Borden, P.E.I. The troop has been joined by practically every boy in the community.

Clay and Salt For Gravel Roads

Department of Highways Experimenting on Schomberg-Alliston Road.

A mixture of clay and common salt is being used in the new formula with which Ontario's Department of Highways is experimenting for the surfacing of gravel roads, it has been learned.

Successful salt highway construction has been reported from New York, Michigan, Vermont, Maryland and other parts of the United States, where it is claimed that the salted roadways provide a hard, non-skid dustless surface at a much lower cost than asphalt or concrete.

The new surfacing is being tested on a few miles of the Schomberg-Alliston Road, while in northern Ontario it is also being used to see how it will stand the severe winter in the north. Salt or calcium chloride is used in proper proportion to the amount of clay and gravel to keep the surface moist, and this damp clay maintains a uniformly hard surface. It is suggested that these salt roads may eliminate the deep holes and ruts which develop in gravel roads.

Salt is used rather than calcium chloride because of the difference in cost.

NO EXPORT Canada As League Member Prohibits Export of Arms To Italy

To what does Canada commit herself when, as a good member of the League of Nations, she accepts the decision of its Assembly to prohibit the export of armaments to Italy? A proclamation in an extra of the Canada Gazette furnishes the answer to this question, enumerating as it does the various articles which it is now illegal to export, re-export or transport to Italy or any Italian possession:

Category I—
1. Rifles and carbines and their barrels.
2. Machine guns, automatic rifles and machine pistols of all calibres and their barrels.
3. Guns, howitzers and mortars of all calibres, their mountings, barrels and recoil mechanisms.
4. Ammunition for the arms enumerated under 1 and 2 above, filled and unfilled projectiles for the arms enumerated under 3 above, and prepared propellant charges for these arms.
5. Grenades, bombs, torpedoes and mines, filled or unfilled and apparatus for their use or discharge.
6. Tanks, armoured vehicles and armoured trains.
7. Armour of all kinds.

Category II—
1. Vessels of war of all kinds including aircraft carriers and submarines.
Category III—
1. Aircraft, assembled or dismantled, both heavier and lighter than air, and their propellers or air screws, fuselages, aerial gun mounts and frames, hulls, tail units and undercarriage units.
2. Aircraft engines.

Bruno - Maskwa Gold Mines, Limited

Reports from the Maskwa property of Bruno-Maskwa Gold Mines, Limited, in the Gunnar Gold area of Manitoba state that shaft-sinking has now reached a depth of 125 feet and drifting is proceeding on the 110 and 122 foot levels. On both horizons, a new vein, carrying good gold values has been intersected. This vein averages from 2 to 3 feet in width and tests are now being made. A crew of between 15 and 18 men is employed at this development.

At the Bruno group, a crew of some 15 men is engaged in surface development. The vein has been stripped for almost 300 feet and has been traced for ¾ mile. The vein averages 3 feet in width. It is the intention of the company to continue development work on both properties throughout the coming winter.

Hunters Fighting Invasion of Rats

SUDBURY, Ont.—The north end of Sudbury is in the throes of one of its periodic invasions of rats from the city dump, half a mile out on the "Food road." Sportsmen have started driving out to the dump at night and picking off the rats with rifle fire under the beams of auto headlights. Poison also is used on the vermin.

Expect during the period of war, Canada, essentially a peaceful and peace-loving country, has not devoted herself very intensively to the manufacture of armaments. Their production from year to year in Canadian factories does not reach a very great volume. It thus involves no remarkable sacrifice on her part to subscribe to the ruling of the League of Nations in regard to the export of arms and munitions which have been listed. But she, of course, will suffer to a considerable extent from loss of her export market in other commodities which are associated with peace rather than war.—Brockville Recorder & Times.
