Stouffville Veterans reorganized on Monday evening at a social function held in the Fire Hall. Comrade Watt presided and it was decided to hold another event on Monday, Dec. 23, at 8 o'clock when a draw will be made in the interests of the Welfare Committee for Christmas cheer. All comrades are heartily welcome, so come and have a real time. Officers elected at this meeting: President, R. Burkholder; Vice, Ormsby Lehman; Sec'y-Treas., Bert Liekovich.

The final sitting of the municipal council for 1935 was a light session on Monday evening, which concluded with a resolution sponsored by Councillor M. E. Watts and directed to Reeve H. W. Sanders, thanking the chief magistrate of the village for his courteous treatment and careful consideration of all matters coming before the Board during the current year. Clerk Dougherty was thanked for handling the relief during the year as special relief officer, the thanks being accompanied by a \$50 check from the town. A number of small accounts were passed for payment which was followed by adjournment sine die at an early hour.

Myron Anderson who underwent an operation while in the Toronto General Hospital is expected home shortly as he is reported making satisfactory recovery. This most recent operation is an effort to bring strength into his wounded arm over which the most skilled physicians have been interested for years, necessitated taking a part of the bone from one of his legs and grafting it to the bones of the arm. The operation included making screws from the bone of the leg with which to fasten a portion onto the bones of the upper part of the arm. If the operation proves successful and growth and activity is stimulated in the maimed arm, it will go down as a great triumph for surgery.
