**GET LENIENCY PLEA BRITISH COURTS**

Secretary of Home Office Proposes Full Inquiry Before Prison Terms

**LAW IN EFFECT FEB. 1**

London—Magistrates of the courts of Britain have received a letter from Sir John Simon, Home Secretary, urging more lenient treatment for those brought into the courts for debt.

After Feb. 1, under the Money Payments Act of 1935, a person who falls to pay must be brought before the court a second time instead of being taken to jail. Imprisonment will only be imposed if the magistrate is convinced of the bad faith of the debtor.

The Home Secretary expresses in the letter his "earnest desire that the number of persons who go to prison each year for nonpayment of debts shall be reduced. He asks the co-operation of magistrates to keep those who have difficulty in paying out of prison.

**Must be Abortion Free**  
A ruling which was not expected has been made by the Health of Animals Branch at Ottawa. Effective January 1 all cattle six months old or more of dairy or breeding type to be exported to the United States must be accompanied by a certificate saying they are free from Bang's disease, also known as infectious abortion.

The certificate signed or endorsed by an official veterinarian of the country of origin must show that the animals are free from the disease and have been subjected to a test within 60 days of the date of exportation showing negative results of the disease.

Official advice received from the United States Federal Department of Agriculture by Dr. George Hilton, Canadian Veterinary Director General, said the order does not include cattle exported for immediate slaughter, steers and spayed heifers and cattle for grazing or feeding which are not of the dairy breeding type. Dr. Hilton said the Health of Animals Branch is prepared to assist farmers in taking necessary measures to free their herds from the disease.

**Alsike Seed Production**  
A survey at the end of October would indicate the following commercial alsike seed production in Canada this year:

Central and western Ontario 200,000 pounds, which is a decidedly light crop when compared with the eight to ten million pounds which used to be produced annually in this part of Canada. A negligible crop is reported in north-western Ontario which ordinarily supplies a fair quality of seed, and only about 5,000 pounds of reasonably pure alsike is indicated in the Timiskaming districts of northern Ontario and Quebec. About two carloads are reported in the Prince George production district of British Columbia. In addition there may be some 1,000,000 pounds of timothy containing more or less alsike in the Timiskaming districts of Ontario and Quebec.

A shortage of alsike for normal Canadian requirements, which approximates 1,500,000 pounds per annum, seems inevitable for next spring, although there may be some importations from the United States and Europe to increase the supply. Prices paid growers in 1935 have not yet been established, but in 1934 when alsike was scarce also growers received from 20 to 25c per pound for no 1 grade.

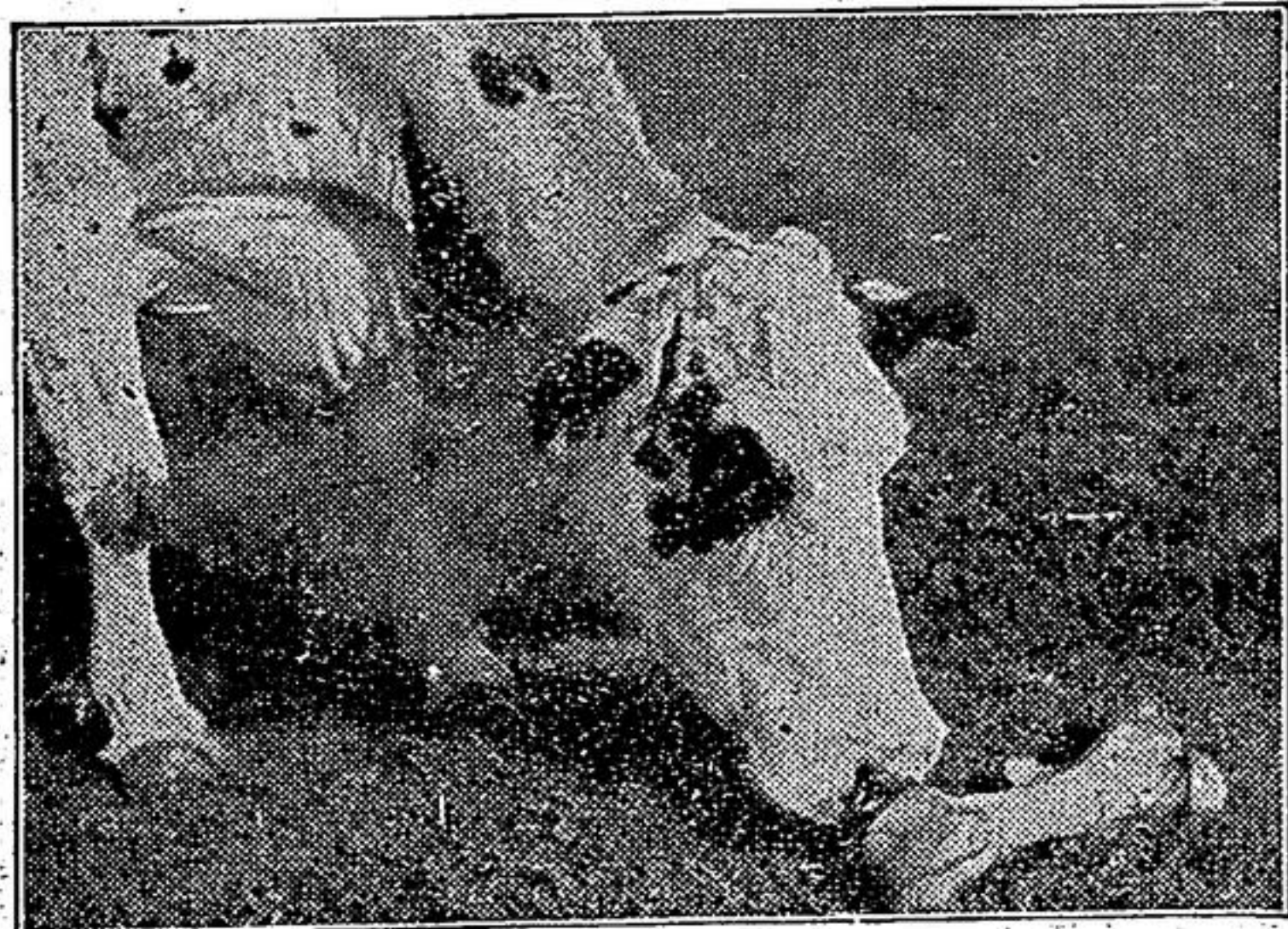

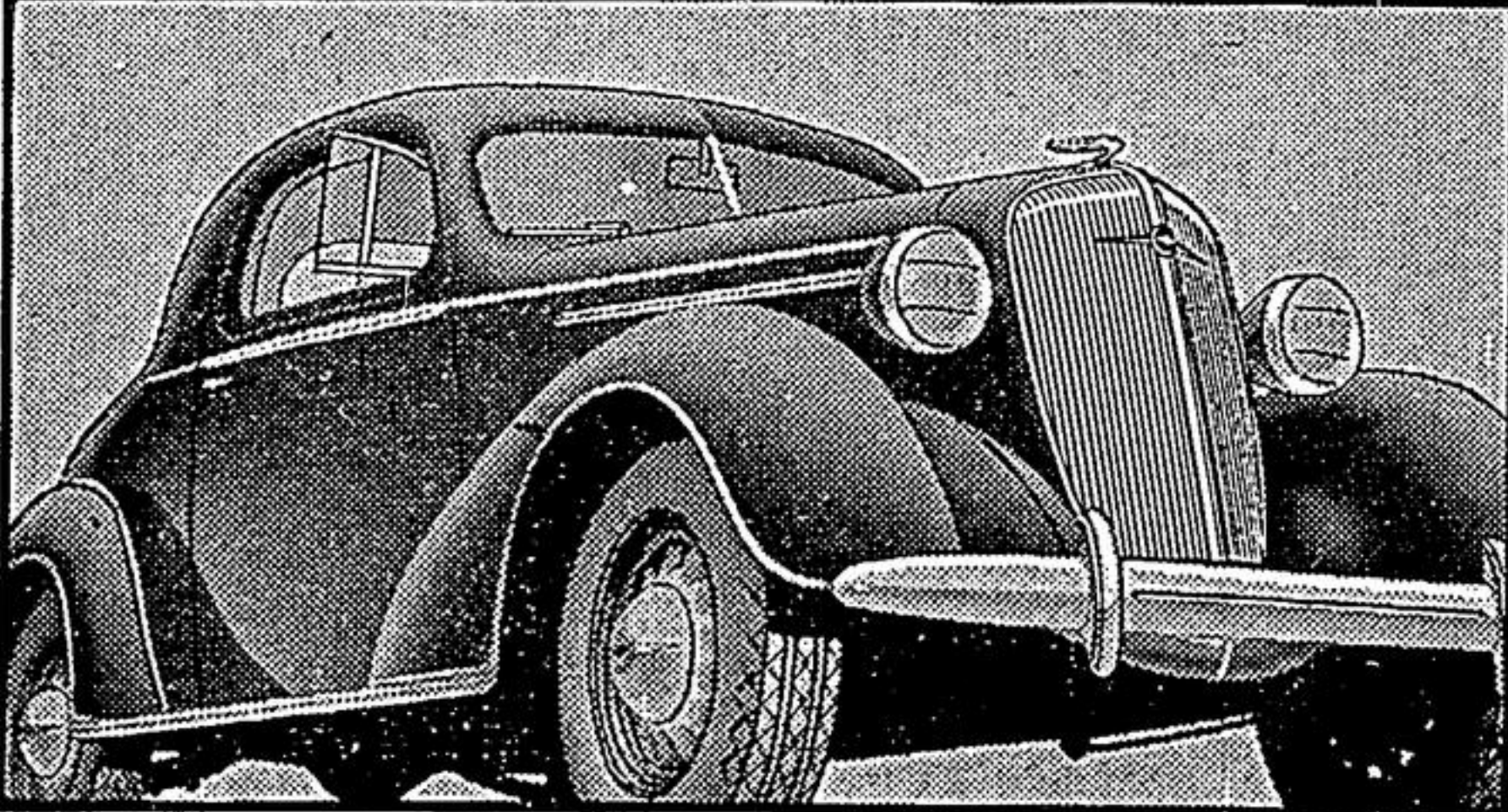
