

Must be Abortion Free A ruling which was not unexpected has been made by the Health of Animals Branch at Ottawa. Effective January 1 all cattle six months old or more of dairy or breeding type to be exported to the United States must be accompanied by a certificate saying they are free

The certificate signed or dorsed by an official veterinarian of the country of origin must show that the animals are free from the disease and have been subjected to a test within 60 days of the date of exportation showing negative results of the disease.


