LET EARLY WEEDS CROW

From the Dominion Entomological Laboratory at Fredericton, N. B., comes rather unusual advice to next year's amateur gardeners. "Don't be so hasty at removing weeds from your vegetable plots during the first two weeks of their planting," says Dr. R. P. Gorham. "The first two weeks of seeding life are the most susceptible to insect injury, particularly by springtails, flea beetles and cutworms. Putting in plenty of seed of the crop wanted and allowing the weed seedings to grow freely is a very good practice. The weed seedlings distribute the destructive effect of the insect feeding and prevent it from being concentrated on the food plants."
