Wednesday was the first day of Lenten season.

Miss Beatrice Spreeman deaconess of the Brunswick Mission of the Mennonite church, delivered two fine addresses in the local church Sunday and Monday evenings last. Miss Spreeman is preparing herself for the work of the foreign mission field, and is a very capable deaconess having the advantage of being a trained nurse in addition to her bible knowledge and speaking ability.

Some folk have an idea that newspapers are costly and up in price, but we have been handed a copy of the Daily Globe of Toronto, dated February 1880, when the yearly subscription rate to that paper was \$18 per year. Back 56 years ago this amount of money would look like a mountain, and was harder a good deal to get than it is today. To be able to take "The Globe" on the yearly basis in 1880 would have been a mark of distinction and a sign of wealth.

We have been asked by these men to pass on this suggestion, knowing that all who have a hydrant by their property will attend to this little detail when cleaning the sidewalks.

What looks like a case of the height of ingratitude is passed on to us, and if it leaves a bad taste in your mouth, do not hold it against all folk on relief, for many are to be pitied, they do the best they know how, and no one can do more. Last week the relief officer, J. S. Dougherty, ordered a half-ton of coal for a relief recipient. To reach the house—about 10 rods of snow near the home had to be removed in order that the truck could get along the road not opened at the time. The village was obliged to engage a man to open the street while the relief recipient sat in his home never offering to give assistance in anticipation of the free coal. This combination of laziness and ingratitude makes it hard for the deserving ones, but it is safe to say that no more coal will reach this chap over a snowbank which the village must engage a man to remove, for an able-bodied recipient of relief coal.

A goodly number of our readers are acquainted with Mr. Calvin Stafford, of Goodwood, whose sister, the late Catharine Johnson of Stouffville will ever be remembered, for a Mission Band in the United Church honored her memory by taking her name, thus the Catharine Johnson Mission Band is a live organization in the church work in Stouffville. Mr. Stafford, who will be 83 years of age on March 26 this year was in the office of this paper on Saturday, and his remarkable physique is good to see in one of his advanced years. Since the death of an unmarried sister, Mary, in 1931, following Mrs. Johnson's death in 1930, Calvin and his brother Amos have kept bachelor quarters in the village there. It is interesting to note there are five members of the family still living, all children of one George Stafford and Matilda Kester who farmed at Goodwood close to a century ago. Three of the five are over 80 years, and two over 70. They are Mrs. Jas. Wagg, who spent much of her life on the farm just north of Stouffville, but is now in Toronto, she being the oldest 85, Calvin 83, Jonathan in Vancouver 81, Nathan in Toronto 73, and Amos 71.

PAY OLD AGE PENSION TO 101,351

Ottawa, Feb. 11th—The number of old age pensions being paid in Canada on March 1st, last, was 101,351, in comparison with 86,873 the year before, according to the report of the auditor-general, tabled in the House of Commons yesterday.
The Dominion pays 75 per cent. of the pensions and the provinces 25 per cent., and last year the Dominion payments increased \$2,628,864 to \$14,942,459.
The report of the auditor-general recommended a conference of provincial officers administering the pensions as there was a wide diversity in methods of administration. Inspection, too, in certain provinces granted in controversy of the act and a number of over-payments.

A reduction of \$2,500 or 31 per cent in costs of operation of the House of Refuge at Newmarket during 1935, was reported to York County Council by the home commissioners, W. L. Stephens and S.G. Harris.

There were 32 admissions to bring the number of inmates at the end of the year to 91. During the year, 13 died and 24 were discharged, the report stated.

LET EARLY WEEDS CROW

From the Dominion Entomological Laboratory at Fredericton, N. B., comes rather unusual advice to next year's amateur gardeners. "Don't be so hasty at removing weeds from your vegetable plots during the first two weeks of their planting," says Dr. R. P. Gorham. "The first two weeks of seedling life are the most susceptible to insect injury, particularly by springtails, flea beetles and cutworms. Putting in plenty of seed of the crop wanted and allowing the weed seedlings to grow freely is a very good practice. The weed seedlings distribute their destructive effect of the insect feeding and prevent it from being concentrated on the food plants."
