#### AN OLD BOY WRITES HOME

Dear Editor & Family of Readers: I am taking time to acquaint you with conditions here in Western Canada at this period. We have had a real winter which set in October .27, and it looks as though there will be no work on the land before May. Our boys are putting up ice which had frozen this spring.

Well, it is 30 years since I came West. and 28 since I brought out my blushing bride. How time does fly. I sure enjoy reading the Tribune, and appreciated that letter of H. S. O'Brien referring to school days. I recall my mother speaking about the same things as he tells. although she would have finished her schooling by that time.

I might say hello to Mr. and Mrs Robt. Winterstein. If ever I longed to be back, it was to attend their sale. How nice to be able to walk in that day and shake hands with so mny old friends sure to be there. In 1903 I worked for Mr. Winterstein, and it was that year his big barn was built. One week ago Sunday I was

listening over the radio to a sermon from Calgary, and the announcer said that prayer had been requested for Grandma Yakes (an old Stouffville girl, Mrs. Dan. Yake) of Cappon. I have never visited Cappon for it is a long way from here, but I met Wellington Yake, her son on two occasions at school convention meetings here. You know some people think Alberta a small place. where one sees everybody. I recall being asked 28 years ago when " was East, by one of your old residents if I had seen his son, and on saying no, he said that was funny as the lived right in Alberta.

I want to say something about our leader in the government. They are doing their best here to make things better for the people of Alberta. Mr. Aberhart is not only premier, but a wonderful preacher. He speaks over the radio on Sunday nights; and last Sunday he wanted to know how many were listening to him. It proved to bring in 13,000 replies, but enemies of the government have forced him off the air, and he will continue to preach in Edmonton to about 1300 people. He does not rely on himself or his government to run his affairs, but upon the Heavenly Father. It is sure-nice to have a praying people at the head of a government. Thank you, this will be all for this time.


