For the most part our village is clean and a sanitary atmosphere prevails everywhere. Still there is the odd premises which requires pressure in order to have them tidy up and keep within the law. Such places will be dealt with.

On Saturday morning the Toronto mail arrived in Stouffville before the express train, but at that the mail was an hour late. The train broke down at Miller's grade about two and a half miles south of the depot. Dr. Sangster volunteered to stand about waiting for the arrival of the train and the mail bags in the usual fashion; he picked up the postmaster and headed south down the Ninth. Turning in at Jim McCreight's lane they were able to get close to the disabled train, and lifted four or five bags of mail for Stouffville. Thus before an auxiliary train arrived from Lindsay at eleven o'clock, folks were reading their morning news, and many people did not realize that anything had happened that necessitated the mail making the last leg of the journey by automobile. Nevertheless on behalf of the citizens, we thank the genial doctor for his kindly act of assistance. The engine became disabled pulling up the grade, and could not be repaired readily, hence it was hauled to Lindsay by the auxiliary engine.

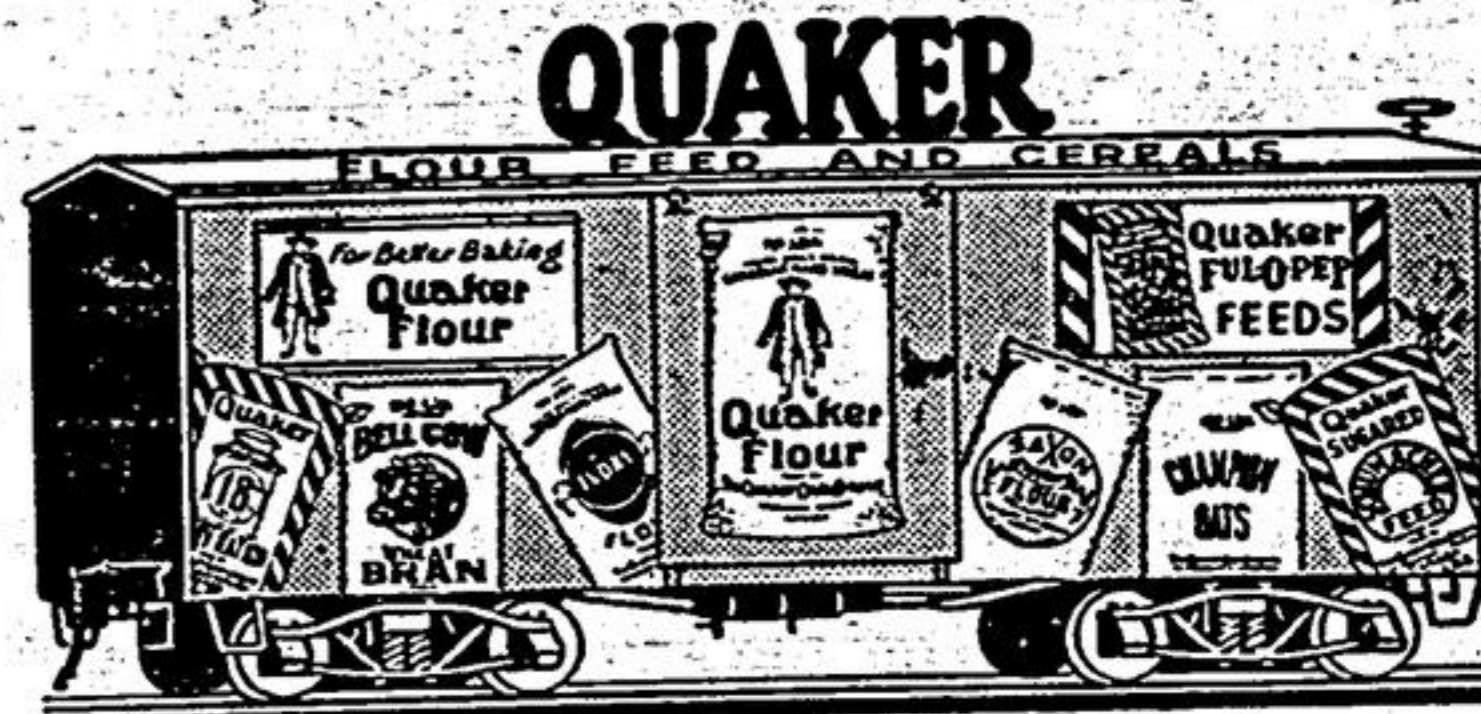
