### EACH MUNICIPALITY PAYS IT'S OWN

Whitchurch Council Petitions Gov't to Entangle Hospitalization From County

In view of the mounting cost of hospitalization in York County and after a study of the matter Whitchurch Council on Saturday unanimously moved to petition the Ontario Gov't for enabling legislation to permit each municipality to bear its own costs, rather than the county making payment, and charging back.

Reeve Rae and Deputy Reeve Toole introduced the matter before the council in session on Saturday by advancing the following resolution:

"That the council of the township of Whitchurch go on record in declaring that whereas the rural municipalities are carrying an unjust burden in the matter of hospitalization costs in the County of York, we petition the provincial government to provide enabling legislation, permitting each municipality to bear its own cost of hospitalization."

Discussing the belated tax rolls where certain payments are still in dispute, Deputy Reeve Toole, insisted that any man who is in arrears for those back years, but who claims to hold a receipt, should only have such tax removed from the roll after the receipt had been actually seen by the treasurer. "A mere member of the council seeing the receipt is not enough," declared Mr. Toole. It is the treasurer's responsibility.

Others voiced the view that the treasurer should be paid extra for journeying about on this matter. "All right," said Mr. Toole, "but let's get this matter cleaned up. There's too much talk and publicity now."

Councillor Lorne Evans introduced a resolution endorsing the action of the Board of Health, requiring that all motor camps and summer camps come under inspection of the local board. Council all agreed.

Relief for the month of May took a sharp drop to \$200, of which \$42 was for fuel supplied to five families. Harry Sproxtion was appointed weed inspector in lieu of S. P. Foote unable to act due to poor health. The matter was brought up by Councillor George Leary.

Three sheep claims, all small, were settled. Ohas. Dennie was awarded \$15 for two sheep killed and one injured by dogs. James Gilbert received \$2 for two sheep injured, and this goes down as the most modest meal the mutton-eating dogs have partaken of this year. Dan Hall received \$7 for 1 killed and 1 injured.

Councillors Evans and Cook moved for a grant of \$10 to the Junior Farmers Live Stock Judging Competition which passed unopposed.

Constable Jack Windsor asked for an increase in pay and was partially successful being advanced to \$3.50 per day while on duty. The east side cop must supply himself a uniform for use this summer.

The session was one of the busiest of the year. Council adjourned at 2 o'clock for the Court of Revision and resumed sitting again at 5 o'clock. Many matters of no public interest took much time up.

J. A. P. Marshall, acknowledged receipt of By-Law establishing salary of Road Superintendent.

Mr. McMullen of the Letter Shop & Supply Co. and Mr. Cave of the Uxbridge Times came before the Council and both were heard re the printing of the Voters Lists, with the contract for printing, going to Uxbridge.


