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## BOARD ACCEPTS LATE RESIGNATION

The members of the Stouffville School Board were given a surprise on Friday evening when Miss Shirley Colclough, B.A., member of the Continuation staff handed in her resignation to take effect immediately. Under the contract which all the staff had signed, notice of giving up the position should have been in by June 15 to become effective at the end of the term just closed. However, the School Board have overlooked this and when they met Saturday, they accepted the resignation, and immediately arranged to fill the vacancy by advertising for a teacher, qualified in the subjects as set out in the advertisement.

Miss Colclough had been on the staff for little more than a year, and was the junior teacher. She was a conscientious young lady, and her advancement to a larger school down in Leamington will be a source of satisfaction to her numerous friends.

## INTERESTING OLD DOCUMENT FOUND

Mr. D. W. Heise, of Gormley, lifelong missionary and preacher, stated to The Tribune the other day that he never knew just how deep the British blood ran in his veins until he was 22 years of age, and was required to sign a document denouncing the Queen of England in connection with taking out naturalization papers in Uncle Sam's domain. Said Mr. Heise, "I was living in the State of Nebraska at the time, September 1882, and was contemplating becoming an American citizen, but never did so. I signed a declaration form, and I guess that aroused my British blood so that I never completed the naturalization, declared Mr. Heise.

The matter was refreshed in Mr. Heise's mind last week, because he came across the declaration which he had taken out 54 years ago at Richardson County. It was the statement against the Queen of England which had much to do with him never joining up with the Stars and Stripes. Here is the exact wording of the declaration which he was required to subscribe to before he could become naturalized at that time and which is then only a preliminary step. It is not naturalization itself. It reads: I, . . . . . do declare on oath my intention to become a citizen of the United States, and to renounce allegiance to all former provinces, potentates, states and severally whatsoever, particularly the Queen of England."

## INDUCTION TUESDAY FOR REV. ATKINSON

The Toronto East Presbytery has set Tuesday, July 7, at 8 p.m. for the induction of Rev. L. J. Atkinson into the pastoral charge of Stouffville United Church.

Rev. D. Wallace Christie will preside over the service which will be held in the auditorium of the local church. Rev. John McEwen, of Melville circuit will preach, Rev. D. H. Woodhouse will address the minister and Mr. J. T. Stewart will address the congregation which is expected to turn out in goodly numbers.

## ACCIDENT CLAIM SETTLED BY CO.

Mrs. Wilson, housekeeper for Mr. M. Leavens and Postmaster J. Leavens, settled a claim last week for damages against the village resulting from a fall on a defective sidewalk on Main street opposite the property of Mr. J. Morrin.

Mrs. Wilson stumbled on a protruding block of cement three weeks ago this Friday, and in falling broke her glasses and suffered bruises to her face.

The matter was placed in the hands of the Accident Insurance Co. with which the village carries a policy protecting them from financial loss under such circumstances. The company's representative came out, made an investigation and offer of settlement covering the cost of glasses and medical attention totalling \$30.

There are several pieces of walk over the village just as dangerous as the place where Mrs. Wilson met with the accident, and it will be up to the council to make prompt repairs before more trouble happens. Insurance premiums are based on the claims made against municipalities, but aside from this aspect of the case walks must be safe for our people to pass over.

We understand that some new walks will be put down this summer and no doubt the ones now laid will get some attention.
