Local Radio Man Gets Contract

Mr. George E. Davies, Prop. of Cedar Beach Dance Gardens, has purchased from Gordon E. Cober local Radio Engineer an entirely new type amplifier with many custom built features which are not to be found on ready made machines.

The Amplifier, a huge 30 watt, capable of handling up to fifteen giant sized speakers, is specially built to Mr. Davies' desires. Provision has been made for several Microphones to be attached which will be used when additions are to be made to the already spacious Hall.

At present there are five speakers all of which are built in and concealed in the walls. There will also be additional speakers placed at various places throughout the grounds. It is suggested there be one at the boat house, one for the beach, and one for the car park. All Microphones and speakers are individually controlled by switches on the instrument panel which are built in on the wall of the orchestra stand.

There is a meter on the instrument panel plainly visible for the band to see while playing, which registers the power of the music which is being applied on the speakers are doing even though they cannot hear them. Mr. Cober the builder of the machine was successful in having the apparatus approved by the H.E.P.C. of Ontario. The approval No. is 4377 which is necessary according to the Ontario Provincial Laws, and should be congratulated in obtaining an approval which is very difficult to obtain. It must pass Govt. standards, and also the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario in their own Laboratories.

The microphone is the latest ball type of Sound Cell Crystal. It is about the same shape and size as a tennis ball, and costs in the neighbourhood of \$100.00 and only weighs approx. two ounces. There is absolutely no hiss with this type of mike, as there is no carbon nor current. It is so sensitive that a person breathing eighteen feet from it can be readily heard all over a large hall.

It is the most powerful complete custom built system installed anywhere to date. It is expected that Mr. Cober will get several large dance hall jobs in Toronto, as several have made inquiries to turn in their present systems for this newest built in type of system which can not be purchased on the market at present.

Commenting on a trip made last week through the Hamilton and Niagara fruit belt, Mr. J. R. Campbell, former deputy reeve of Markham, declared that conditions were almost indescribable. The whole area was literally burned up. Tomatoes in large acreage were ripe, and on one side they were tried by the sun, while grapes suffered immensely from the heat. Farmers who sell their crop to the canners all receive a down payment when planting is completed, and several of them told Mr. Campbell they would not have enough crop to pay off the advance money given them.

Farmers and others had a hard time saving their fowl from the heat and instances were brought to our notice right in the village where poultry was taken to the cellar of the home to revive. One farmer saved his flock by drenching them with water, and others cooled the pens in the same manner. While many birds died, it is marvelous how few passed out by way of the sun's heat instead of awaiting the customary route by way of the roasting pan.

Frank Yake, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. William Yake, of Stouffville is confined to the hospital in Calgary, with a dislocated collarbone received in a fall on the 24th of May. Although he says in a letter to his mother that he is receiving the best of care it will be from 7 to 12 weeks before he can leave the hospital. Frank who has been in the West for 10 years has no intention of coming East. If any of his school mates wish to write to Frank the address is General Hospital Calgary, Alta.

Constable Qutbell had his work provided for him every evening since last Thursday when it was discovered that the town reservoirs were running low, in keeping with wells all over Ontario. Instead of sending out the customary notices to all householders, a card was stuck on a post at the post office, and few appeared to have seen it. Anyway, when the cop cruised around they apologized and said they hadn't seen the notice forbidding the use of hose. Many of them were telling the truth too. Fair minded citizens however quickly fell into line, but every other evening the chief had his time with those who sneaked a line of hose out after dark, having more thought for their flower bed or potato patch than the preservation of their home from fire.
