**MINING NEWS**

Laguna Gold Mines' September production amounted to approximately \$28,000, as compared with \$31,000 in August, according to J. H. C. Waite, president, who has just returned from the property. This is considered satisfactory in view of the fact that during September the large part of mill feed came from the dump, which has an estimated grade considerably less than the mine average. The large amount of ore is now being drawn from the mine and it is expected that millheads will show improvement. Shaft sinking is proceeding and a station has been cut at 875-foot level. At least one more level is to be opened up immediately at 1,000 feet. The stopes that are being opened on the 150-foot and 600-foot levels show indications of being somewhat better than the drifts, it is stated.

Atnel Mines, Ltd., has acquired eight additional claims, six of which are located to the south and two on the north of the main property in the Michipicoten area. The new acreage gives Atnel a total of 800 acres, and it is understood that the company may acquire further claims which will give them a total of 1,000 acres.

Installation of the 100-ton mill at the Morris Kirkland Gold Mines property has been completed and the new unit will go into operation within the next week or ten days. The mill has been designed so that with little cost it can be stepped up to 150 tons per day. Crushing of ore will be started this week to fill the mill bins in preparation for starting the ball mill October 26th. It is estimated it will take 10 days to two weeks to fill the circuit and tune up the mill. Results of work on the lower levels indicate the company will be able to provide mill feed of a much higher grade than formerly estimated. Several veins have been cut on the new deep levels between 750 and 1,250-foot, where ore is uniformly from 60 to 100 per cent higher in grade than on the levels above the 750-foot level. On surface another important development is taking place 150 feet from the shaft.

Following reports of further financing by New York interests, Bram Watkins, president of Cumpitau Mines, stated that Mining Research Corp. have laid out a large program of development which has already commenced. Diamond drilling contracts are being let for underground and surface drilling campaigns on both the Cumpitau property and the Alexo property, which they recently acquired. While no confirmation of the new financing was available, a statement from New York is expected shortly.

Noranda Mines will shortly commence construction of a hydro electric power plant of 30,000 h.p. capacity at a cost of \$5,000,000, for its own use, according to an announcement made by James Y. Mur-

dock, president. Work on the new plant will be started as soon as a few minor remaining details are approved by the Quebec Government. Mr. Murdock states in making the announcement. While he could not estimate the saving that would be made by the production of their own power, it is believed that the cost will be considerably lower than the cost of power presently contracted for.

Skookum Gold Mines' second diamond drill hole put down on the No. 3 vein has encountered two lamprophyre dykes separated by 40 feet of core length of sheared mineralized granite, according to a wire received at the company head office from J. D. Turner, resident engineer. A considerable quantity of quartz shows in both dykes and in the hanging and foot walls. Mineralization consists of pyrite and chalcopyrite.

**The Man Who is Educated**

Dr. Duncan McArthur, Deputy Minister of Labor for Ontario, talked plainly when he addressed the Certified Public Accountants at their annual dinner in Toronto, observes the Peterborough Examiner. He touched on the cultural value of classics, but admitted boldly that as far as equipment to thousands of boys and girls they possessed no value. It was interesting also to find that of all pupils attending secondary schools only seven per cent go on for university training. That figure suggests strongly that the training received in secondary schools is all that 93 per cent of the pupils are going to receive. Making the course flexible is the matter needing attention. A general course is not adapted to a specific purpose, and yet a great many employers keep asking applicants for positions if they have matriculation standing. They appear willing to accept that as a standard, although it must be quite true that a number of these employers do not understand what matriculation is and what subjects have been taken to secure it.

Dr. McArthur believes there are thousands of men and women who have never darkened the door of a university who are better educated than many university graduates. He does not believe that listening to lectures and writing examinations is the sum total of education. And right there he raises a fairly large issue. Who is the educated man? A hard question to answer. We recall hearing a surgeon discuss this matter. The surgeon had a number of letters at the end of his name. He was highly skilled, enjoyed a large practice, but he never quit studying. He was as much a student after 25 years of practice as he was when attending university. His experience was this: "I wanted to get away from the city and accepted the invitation of an old prospector and trapper and woodsman whom I had treated pro-

fessionally several years before. I had to take a long trip and a rough one to find my way to his lonely shack. One night I regarded him as an educated man because his schooling had been limited, but he had about 50 books in his little cabin and there was not a little of trash in the collection. When I went out with him I was amazed at his knowledge of the woods of manner in which he knew the habits and of animals, birds, fish and everything in the woods. When it came to rocks it was the same. He was master of the situation and I was as useless and ignorant in his field as he would have been before my operating table. His schooling had been meagre; but mine had been extensive, but that mine had been in the shanty was a geologist and an author in his field as he would have been before my operating table. He was highly educated. As far as mental equipment is concerned: he was my equal."

The business of becoming educated shows itself on the surface of various places. Right now we find there are 625 students who have enrolled for night classes in Peterborough. It may be that many of them are working in daytime and have found the need of more instruction. They are on the right path and very often in the night classes the student secures that which he can apply in to the work in which he is engaged. He studies at night and secures practical application of his studies by day. It may be a fact that but seven per cent of pupils in secondary schools go on for university training, but the bright spot for the 93 per cent is that one can learn a great deal by personal application after school days are over.

**Index to Character**

Eyes Betray People Most of All Because Expression Cannot be Controlled

Don't believe the generalizations you've heard about people's disappearance.

Don't, for instance, believe that there is anything unattractive about the character of a person with small eyes. Or that eyes close together mean dishonesty; or a big chin will-power; or brown eyes kindness. None of these is true, unless here are a great many other characteristics that back them up.

For instance, you can only be sure that a man with a jutting chin has a strong will if he also has (1) a good-sized nose; (2) a firmly shut mouth; (3) a not too short upper lip, and; (4) a firm decisive way of walking and moving his hands. Many weak people have big chins, and many strong-willed people what are popularly "classed" as receding chins.

It is obviously important not to rely entirely on your first impressions. But your first quick judgment can give you a reliable general outline of what they are like.

**Eyes Uncontrollable**

First, EYES. They betray people because you cannot control the expression of your eyes. You will usually find that people with dark grey eyes are clever, and with soft brown eyes sentimental—but not necessarily kind! A great many sentimental people are cruel or selfish.

Black eyes, usually going with a strong constitution, mean either a gay temperament or quick temper, or both. Brilliant light blue eyes stupidity. Greenish eyes— which usually verge on grey—indicate intelligence. Dark-colored flecks in grey or green eyes show great intelligence or imagination.

On the whole, artistic or imaginative people have big eyes, and small eyes usually denote very practical people—not dishonest, though dishonest people are often practical. Eyes with pupils that change size, getting larger or smaller, indicate sensitiveness, and if the pupils do this to an exaggerated extent, it means that this person has a vivid imagination.

Second, MOUTHS. The shape of any adult person's mouth depends on their habits of thought and action.

Secretive people have thin, shut lips. A full under lip means sometimes greed or lack of control. A mouth never quite shut or loosey shut means indecision—lack of will. A pouting mouth means selfishness and hard or turned-down corners show sulksiness or bad temper. A mouth with a short upper lip means a character lacking stability, though this feature often belongs to people of great intelligence, and is considered, in women, an attribute of beauty.

A wide mouth is, if it is well shaped, one of the best signs of character, meaning generosity and unselfishness. And all types of small mouths are bad signs, whether they are full-lipped and small (greed and selfish), or thin lipped and small, which indicates unscrupulousness and selfishness.

A real Cupid's bow upper lip, in the form of a mouth, not painted on, is a sign of a charming, gay, and generous character.

Third (most important), WALK AND GESTURES. You can get this clue 50 yards away!

As a rule conceited people hold themselves stiffly with their heads up. Timid people hold themselves stiffly too, but with their heads poked forward and shoulders rounded. Shy people use their hands as if they were afraid to grasp anything easily and comfortably, and tend, in the street, to keep near a wall too, or lean on something, and avoid standi gap straight by themselves.

An easy, natural walk is a sign of ease of mind and a well-regulated character. Fidgety gestures and uneven pace mean nerves, irritability, lack of control. Excitable people usually take small steps, and calm ones long steps. People who visibly "hurry" and "hustle" or move with jerky steps are obviously people with little self-confidence and no power to achieve what they want by patience.

**Preservation of Farm Fence Posts**

Experiments have been conducted to determine the relative merits of treated and untreated fence posts. In one experiment started in 1927, posts were treated with coal tar or creosote while other posts were left untreated. In 1936 all the treated posts were found to be sound, but all the untreated ones were either completely rotted a few inches below the ground or showed such advanced stages of rot that they will have to be replaced within the next year. As it was, several of the untreated posts had to be replaced in 1934 and 1925.
