EX-WARDEN OF ONTARIO COUNTY LAID TO REST

A highly respected and life-long resident of Claremont, was Duncan M. Morgan, who passed to his rest in St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto on Wednesday, October 23th as reported in The Tribune briefly last week. Deceased had been in failing health for some time and was taken to the hospital about two weeks prior to his death, which followed a major surgical operation. He was born in Claremont 76 years ago, the eldest son of the late Alexander Morgan, and was the last surviving member of a family of three sons and four daughters. His entire life had been spent in the village and on his farm on the townline just north of it. He was a man widely known throughout the county as an earlier life he had taken an active part in municipal affairs and was at one time reeve of Uxbridge Township, also an ex-Warden of Ontario County.

At the time of his death he was a director of the Maple Leaf Insurance Company, which position he had held for several years. Other positions held by the late Mr. Morgan at time of death were those of secretary of Brougham Union Lodge A.F. & A.M., of which he was a Past Master, and of the Claremont Public School Board. He was a member and regular attendant of the Baptist Church and a Liberal in politics. Surviving are his wife and a family of two sons and four daughters by a former marriage. These are: Roy, on the old homestead, Alex. of Lindsay, Mrs. D. A. Pugh and Mrs. E. Pugh of Claremont, Mrs. L. Feasby of Sandford, and Mrs. E. Ormerod of Cannington. The funeral was held on Saturday afternoon, October 31st, with private service at the home, conducted by his pastor, Rev. P. D. Augustine, followed by a Masonic service in the Baptist church. Interment took place in Claremont Union Cemetery.
