at 12 but we woke up in the morning and found that we were still in Shanghai. Someone told us later it was not uncommon for the Chinese boats to sail a day or night late.

Already we have been impressed tremendously with the need of this great land. One has to be here to understand what China's teeming millions means. Everywhere one finds throngs of people of all classes from the beggars to high government officials. I witnessed a scene on the boat the first day up the Yangtze that made me praise God for the privilege of being born in a Christianized land and gave me a greater desire to press on in the work that God has called me to.

The boat stopped to meet a small junk coming from a village to take on passengers for shore and unload cargo. They had almost finished when two of the crew on our boat picked up an old sick man that was just skin and bones and almost dead and threw him into the junk where he lay squirming with pain. I suppose he was a beggar for all he had on was a pair of dirty shorts and a sack for a shirt with paper wrapped around his legs.

Last Friday we arrived here at Hwaining where I am finishing and prepared this letter for circulation. It is almost five weeks since I left home. One surely is glad to get settled in this comfortable home in the midst of this very Chinese city. When we arrived it seemed as though almost the entire city was out to see these foreigners for there were simply crowds around the dock. First they would look us over then discuss us among themselves. I suppose they thought we were funny looking specimens of humanity.

After a few rows among themselves as to who was going to carry all of our baggage the coolies finally got it together on the main street. The parade then started. Mr. Walton went on with a couple of rickshaws full of light luggage then we followed in two led by Mr. Mair and Mr. Yen, one of our teachers. After us came the coolies with our baggage on wheel barrows and poles, and finally a group of very curious Chinese.

At the city gate proper we were stopped by soldiers but after a few kindly words from Mr. Yen and Mr. Mair we were allowed to proceed and after a fifteen minute walk through the very narrow streets we arrived at the desired haven with praise in our hearts to God who had brought us safely over thousands of miles of sea and land.

Our first lesson in Chinese consisted in being given our Chinese names and the tones. Since then we have all been hard at it practising them. I thought I would never get rid of my name till I got to Heaven but the Chinese got rid of it sooner and call me Mr. Ku Lih Kai, the first being my surname and the latter two equivalent to my Christian name in English. The last name Kai means victory so here's hoping I soon get the victory over the language.

Thank you again for your kindness and continued prayers for me. May God richly bless you all in Him.
