MARKHAM FARMER DIES IN 75TH YEAR

The death of John Franklin Pipher on Sunday, Dec. 13, 1936, at his home on the 8th concession of Markham near the Wideman church came as a shock to many old friends who were not aware of his serious illness of the past few weeks. He was in his 75th year, and was laid to rest at the Dickson Hill cemetery on Tuesday afternoon, service being held in the church, conducted by his pastor Rev. W. Brown of Markham, assisted by Rev. I. Brubaker. It was most fitting and unique that Mr. Goudie should also participate in this service in that he performed the marriage ceremony over 40 years ago when the deceased took for his wife Sarah W. Raymer of south Markham.

The late J. F. Pipher spent all his days in the township where he died. He was industrious and worked his way up to be a land owner and when he took his life partner the couple continued to reside in the township. He is survived by his faithful partner and by four sons and three daughters. The sons are Clarence of Pickering Township, Gordon and Wilfrid at home and Rev. L. R. Pipher, New Dundee. The daughters are Mrs. Edgar Lager, Miss Bertha, and Mrs. Pike, wife of Rev. R. J. Pike, of Badgeros, near Dundalk. Three brothers living near Orillia also survive.

RINGWOOD IS TO BE ENTERTAINED

The Hamlet to go Modern With up-to-date Amusement Resort for Boxing and Wrestling.

Ringwood is shortly to have an amusement business if the present intentions of Mr. J. R. McKenzie, proprietor of the former garage opposite Sinclair's Roadhouse, turn out correctly. Mr. McKenzie is now making plans to turn the fine building into an Amusement House for boxing and wrestling, and such other entertainment as may be secured for presentation there.

A suitable stage will be constructed with ringside seats all round, and some of the best amateur boxing and wrestling boys in the business are expected to be brought to the new "Stadium" when once it gets under way.

The building was originally constructed by Mr. McKenzie as a modern garage, but it is believed by some that a more elaborate place was constructed and established than the business of the district warranted, and hence it failed to function successfully, and after being under various managers, went into liquidation. The place was steam heated and was equipped with an automatic feed furnace, but recently the heating feature was removed.

PEOPLE'S CHURCH SEES OPENING HERE

Will Hold Regular Services in Oddfellow's Hall Each Sunday Evening—Eight Religious Bodies Will Now be Operating in Stouffville.

With The Peoples' Church, Toronto, commencing regular Sunday evening services in Stouffville, we are reminded that this makes the eighth religious organization to make a weekly appeal to our people. In addition to the old established churches including: Congregational, Christian, Mennonite, Presbyterian, Anglican, United and Baptist (six) we have services by the Faith and Truth Church, Toronto, and now we are to have a branch of the Peoples' Church, an organization which has had a marvelous growth in Toronto, and is operated on the fundamental principles of the Bible, and which attracts one of Toronto's largest congregations each Sunday at its Bloor street edifice.

The attraction for so many spiritual bodies in Stouffville is not quite clear; it may be the lure of our friendliness which brings them here, or on the other hand these alert christian workers, have concluded that there is a great scope for the expansion of the missionary work in this particular spot. In any event Stouffville, we believe, has established a record in the number of christian organizations or separate units operating among a population of 1100 people—where in Ontario with a similar population is eight religious bodies in operation.

Four of our people have reached the 80 mark and are still with us. They are Alex. Mitchell whose birthday comes on January 21, Thos. Vague 80, Mrs. Milton Fockler will be 80 on January 9, and David H. Gillham in January. One record Ringwood can boast of at this time is that three of its citizens will celebrate their 80th birthday in January.

MUNICIPAL GOSSIP ON MAIN STREET

Ratepayers of Stouffville should make it their duty to attend the public meeting to be held in Ratcliff's Hall next Monday evening, and known as the nomination meeting. From 7.30 to 8.30 nominations will be received for reeve, councillors, three school trustees for two years, and one to be elected for one year, to fill out the unexpired term of Edward Baker who moved recent from town. One cemetery commissioner will have to be named also. The term of K. G. Tarr expires, and is open for an acclamation. On the school board the following have completed their term of office: Rev. C. E. McLeod, Ambrose Stover and Jake McMullen.

Mr. M. E. Watts says he is definitely through as a member of the village council, pleading lack of time to attend to the duties. Mervyn has given the town some good service, and it was thought at one time that he would go through to the top, but of his own choice he declines.

While Reeve Sanders and Councillors Weldon, Brillinger and Brown are not what one would call enthusiastic, the press expects that they will be willing to carry on. The reeve we are told, would give way if Mr. Weldon wished to step up, but Mr. Weldon has not expressed any desire for advancement. So far, we have heard of little new timber for the council, W. E. Morden has been mentioned as a candidate for reeveship. E. A. Button has been approached to allow his name to stand for councillor, but he has not consented.

Ira Rusnell may allow his name to stand for councillor. He stands for expansion of our water system that would do away with the summer shortage.

H. J. Malloy is mentioned as new blood for the council, but so far has not yet decided to make a run for it. "Pat" would have the time to devote to the job if he once stepped into the municipal field.

Mr. Arthur Swift, garageman, may offer himself for a seat on the council provided there is to be an election, but said Mr. Swift, "I would not consider causing an election." Mr. Swift has no criticism to offer of past servants, but he contends that there is real vision needed at this time, and as a business man of quite a few years he is willing to lay his shoulder to the wheel.

This year the citizens are looking forward to a solution of the summer water shortage. They are generally aware that plenty of water is running to waste, and that a means need only be found to house this waste for use in the dry season.

Whether this question will be to the fore or not on nomination night, we do not know, but last summer several of the members were pledged to do what they could to provide more storage capacity, for town water so that the supply would not run dangerously low in July and August as it has in past years. There is ample water running to waste to tide over the dry hot weather if it could be taken care of.

Whatever happens the ratepayers should accord the retiring council and school trustees a good meeting on Monday evening. They spend many hours during the year working for the corporation and citizens should be interested enough to come out and give an hours' thought to civic affairs.
