To the Electors of the Township of Uxbridge:

Ladies and Gentlemen:
I have served your township for the past six years, four as councillor and two as deputy reeve, and during which time I have looked forward to eventually becoming your reeve. I feel that in these six years, I have gained enough experience in township matters to fill the position ably and with this in view, I have much pleasure in offering my name for reeve for the year 1937.

During the years I have served our municipality I have always kept in mind the welfare of the residents and would draw your attention to the fact that in that time the township tax rate has been reduced four mills. This has greatly lightened the burden of the highly-assessed taxpayer and benefitted the township as a whole.

For the past two years, Reeve Pickard and the writer have been your representatives on the County Council, and, gaining the confidence of the other members of council, we were successful in obtaining for Uxbridge Township the sum of \$10,238.00 which was spent on county roads in 1936. Further, I had the pleasure of going over the Goodwood road with the County Road Board and the County Engineer, Mr. D. J. Kean, and they have recommended that the road be prepared in 1937, both east and west of Goodwood, for a hard surfaced road and will give all county roads in the township due consideration.

Owing to the fact that I have not been well for the past three or four weeks, I do not expect to be able to call on nearly all of the electors, but I hope to be entirely well in a short time.

I would therefore respectfully request your support for my election as reeve on January 4th, 1937 and my best wishes go to all of you for a Happy and Prosperous New Year.
