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FILLED CHURCHES ATTEND THE UNION PRAYER SERVICES

The universal week of prayer is being recognized in Stouffville by joint nightly meetings of all church denominations. Beginning on Monday evening last in Baptist Church Rev. L. E. Atkinson, United Church minister, delivered the address, and on Tuesday evening in the Christian Church Rev. I. B. Brubacher, M.B.C. pastor, preached. This Wednesday evening Rev. W. H. Fuller will have charge in the Mennonite Church and on Thursday in the Presbyterian Church the speaker will be Mr. Arthur Greer, Christian Church pastor. On Friday evening the final meeting will be in the United Church and the address will be made by Rev. C. S. McGrath, the Baptist pastor. All meetings commence at 8 o'clock.

This is regarded as the most whole-hearted united front yet displayed by the many churches in this town, and if the members and adherents enter into the spirit of these meetings with the keenness of all the pastors, there's going to be filled churches with the attendance growing nightly with increased interest. Prayers at each meeting will embody special petitions for thanksgiving, confession, and for petitions.

Toole Sweeps Whitchurch for Reeveship

Jess Cook Elected Deputy-reeve and George Leary, Herbert Wells, Herman Kidd, Councillors.

Whitchurch Township turned out a majority of 521 for C. Earl Toole at the civic elections on Monday, over Newton Rae last year's reeve. For Deputy-reeve Jess Cook won over Lorne P. Evans by a majority of 68. For council the veteran Geo. H. Leary topped the poll with a majority of 38 over his nearest opponent Herb Wells; the only new man on the council without previous experience. Mr. Wells polled 556 votes as against Mr. Leary's 594. Herman Kidd, a former reeve stands in third place with 463 votes, and is therefore elected to the council. Wesley C. Williams made a good run too with 451, but of course stands defeated with Isaac N. Morton, and William Winger, the latter being a new man in the municipality and a carpenter living in the north end of the township. Wm. Card of Vivian was defeated.
